



2021 Impact Statements

Animals

Animal Adoption Center

Thanks to Old Bill's Fun Run, the Co-Challengers, and our generous animal loving donors we were able to save the lives of 372 dogs, puppies, cats, and kittens in 2021. This grant allowed us to connect desperate, homeless animals with their loving forever families. Funds were used to ensure all of our animals were spayed or neutered, vaccinated, and microchipped prior to adoption. In special cases, injured animals underwent advanced medical procedures so that they could live their best life in the Tetons. Additionally, all puppies and any dog with behavioral challenges, had access to training sessions with our certified dog trainer. Old Bill's fuels our mission and makes bright futures possible for animals in need.

Animal Shelter-Jackson/Teton County

As a direct result of Old Bill's support, the Animal Shelter was able to perform diagnostic testing, provide necessary surgeries and microchipping, and offer individualized care, food, and treatment prior to adoption. We were also able to drastically reduce unwanted litters by spaying and neutering all homeless animals that come through the shelter. The funds also help in keeping the local feline population healthy by performing FELV/FIV tests on every one of our cats. In addition, Old Bill's donations funded the part-time kennel technicians that help provide dedicated and experienced care to all in-house animals 7 days a week.

Dog Is My CoPilot

Animal transport programs are key to ending the euthanasia of adoptable animals because of shelter overcrowding. Thousands of dogs and cats have been saved by flying them from areas with not enough homes to regions of the country like Teton County where loving families are waiting to adopt them. Many of the animals you'll see in our community have been flown by Dog Is My CoPilot and adopted through our local rescue partners!

Jackson Hole Horse Rescue

Old Bill's Fun Run Grant is the life-blood of Jackson Hole Horse Rescue. Without it we simply could not exist. In the past year we rescued 15 horses and found homes for most of them. Some will live out their remaining days in our care. Five horses died this past year, all related to old age. Almost all of the horses we take in are old and/or in poor health. As of April 30, 2021 we have 27 horses in our care. It is such a labor of love to care for an old broken-down horse and help make its remaining days comfortable and rewarding. You could call us an "Old-Folks-Home for horses."

Jackson Hole Police K-9 Auxiliary

Our grass roots organization could not serve the needs of our wonderful community without the ongoing support from Old Bill's Fun Run. Thanks to Old Bill's 2021, we were able to continue fulfilling our mission to provide financial assistance to local law enforcement for expenses such as dog food, vet bills and Officer/K-9 continuing education and recertification. Upcoming significant expenses in 2022 include specialized retrofitting of two new police cruisers to accommodate our current K-9 teams. Addition of another K-9 to serve the needs of our locals and visiting guests is also planned for the near future. We could not function in our current capacity without Old Bill's Fun Run, plain and simple.

PAWS of Jackson Hole

Old Bill's Funding had an immediate impact on local pets and their people in 2021 in several ways. During COVID we saw a dramatic increase in the number of requests for financial assistance for emergency veterinary care and spay/neuter. We were also able to get back into the classroom to teach 4th and 5th grade students



about responsible pet ownership and compassion for pets. We delivered a new training to our Disaster Animal Response Team, ensuring our community's preparedness to care for pets during an evacuation and we delivered thousands of free mutt mitts on our trails.

Teton Raptor Center

445 live raptor education programs for 17,397 participants of all ages. 14 raptor research projects conducted or ongoing. 167 injured, ill, or orphaned birds cared for in TRC's rehabilitation clinic. 87 engaged and dedicated volunteers donated 7,350 hours of service. 647 Poo-Poo screens were distributed to save cavity-nesting wildlife. Launched a new conservation initiative, Sporting Lead-Free, to reduce inadvertent lead consumption by wildlife. The historic Hardeman Ranch received additional improvements and restoration to become a home for world-class raptor conservation.

Arts & Culture

Art Association of Jackson Hole

Thanks to the support from the Old Bill's Fun Run grant, the Art Association of Jackson Hole brought visual art experiences to thousands of community members through classes, intensive workshops, youth summer camps, gallery exhibits, community outreach programs and Art Fairs. 1,400 children and 680 adults were served with 1800 hours of instruction. We proudly partnered with over 30 local nonprofits and agencies to bring art education and art therapy to low-income, senior, disabled, and other vulnerable community members.

BOUNDLESS

Old Bill's Fun Run has a tremendous impact on Boundless- Opportunities for Children. The Old Bill's Fun Run match helps provide over 60 children annually the opportunity to participate in extra-curricular activities in arts, athletics, and educational programs. Thanks to Old Bill's Fun Run, we are helping children's dreams literally come true. Now more than ever, children need access. Thank you Old Bill's for your continued support of Boundless and the many wonderful non-profits organizations in Teton County.

Cathedral Voices Chamber Choir

Small nonprofits are able to have a real, lasting impact in our community because of Old Bill's Fun Run. The financial support allows us to maintain and grow programming that is accessible and often free, allowing all to have access to arts & culture activities. Our mental health - as a whole community - depends upon these options being available to EVERYONE.

Center for the Arts

The Center's 78,000 square foot, 3 acre campus is home to 22 Resident organizations. The Center's campus is activated 323 days of the year for events, of which over 95% are presented by local nonprofits. Hundreds of people of all ages work and participate in creative and educational activities at The Center. The Center maintains an exceptional, modern campus for Residents and community, and employs staff to support the arts and all the attendant activities. By administering the facility and providing support for Residents, The Center ensures that our community has access to the arts and culture, a central part of civic life in Teton County.

Dancers' Workshop

Through Old Bill's Fun Run Dancers Workshop DW has evolved into a recognizable and enriching community staple. 2021's Old Bill's Fun Run ushered Dancers' Workshop (DW) into its 50th Year of providing dance education, performance and outreach to students and audiences of all ages. Though live performances were still on the rebound from the effects of COVID19 we were able to provide live dance instruction to app. 350 youth and 400 adults. Our local and statewide outreach programs serviced 1,500 elementary aged children and we estimate that 3,100 audiences enjoyed dance performances in The Center Theater including our annual Winter Production,



New York City Ballet, New Dances New Choreographers and our year end Progress Performances. Philanthropic support has been vital to our evolution and development. New projects in incubation thanks to Old Bill's include a virtual classroom, a new Commissioned Artist-in-Residence program and further integration into our Latino population.

Global Arts & Innovation Network

Despite the challenges of the pandemic, GAIN was able to resume most of our contracts with our local maker space partners and the Friday TCSD full day intensive workshops. These times have also presented us with new collaboration opportunities with Spread the Love and Carve the Future and we are excited to have finally found an avenue to expand our audiovisual education outreach to the Wind River Reservation. We are very much looking forward to moving classes into the open air this summer and to continue to reach out to our local underserved communities.

Grand Teton Music Festival

Live music is powerful. It soothes, entertains, and inspires, making life brighter and more meaningful. Everyone deserves opportunities to find fulfillment through the experience of live music. The 2021 Old Bill's Fun Run grant to the Grand Teton Music Festival helped provide 13,952 of those opportunities to people in Jackson Hole last year. The grant facilitated this impact by helping the Festival present 64 symphonic, chamber music, popular artist, education, and community programs in Teton County, WY. The grant also empowered the Festival to launch new initiatives. GTMF On the Road debuted in summer 2021 creating free access to music for 927 community members through 17 outdoor concerts. GTMF Presents launched last December, bringing acclaimed artists WindSync to engage 715 Teton County children and adults through concerts and education activities. Without funding through Old Bill's, our community would not have had access to this many musical experiences in 2021.

Jackson Hole Chamber Music

Last years Old Bills' grant will make a big impact on our operations for this years festival. After resuming limited concerts last year due to the pandemic we are once again planning a full festival and are including piano in our repertoire for the first time since the inaugural season. To celebrate our 5th season we are commissioning a piece with a composer in resident. We will use the funds for funding travel expense of the musicians and their instruments and as fare into JH continue to increase this is becoming increasingly costly as well. Fund will also be used to offset the cost of meals at Antelope Ranch the host of the concerts.

Jackson Hole Community Band

2022 has proven to be the year of return for live music! This past winter we were able to have our return to the stage at the Center for the Arts for our first concert since December 2019. A positive outcome from COVID-19 is that we now have the capability to live-stream our concerts so families and those in the community unable to attend can stream our music from across the country and even across the world. With the support we receive from Old Bill's we plan to help the community get back to "new normal" with as many performances the community has been used to in years past.

Jackson Hole Food & Wine

Our festival offers a unique cultural element and multiple opportunities for locals and visitors to connect with top local and visiting chefs, wineries, and beverage producers. We are able to expand the culinary conversation and provide an important platform to highlight our beneficiary Hole Food Rescue. In 2021, we were able to donate \$12,500 to their organization.



Jackson Hole Historical Society and Museum

In 2021 JHSM welcomed 7,118 visitors to the museum and guided 300 people on historic downtown walking tours. One review stated, "Great place to learn about the area! The museum staff member pointed out something she thought we might be interested in and we got a lot more out of our experience because of her knowledge and enthusiasm!" JHSM led more than 40 youth programs for 900 students, including summer day camps, field trips and lessons for both homeschool families and TCSD classrooms. JHSM was able to host 6 virtual adult education programs with 465 participants. JHSM assisted 187 researchers in 2021, a 30% increase over last year. The research and collections department processed over 2,000 historic photographs, objects, and documents to an online database offering free access and online viewing.

Jackson Hole Jewish Community Center

Last year we received an unprecedented donation from Old Bill's (thank you!) and intend to produce some bigger programs this summer and next fall. To date, we have begun to resume in-person events with enthusiastic and well-attended audiences. We collaborated with the Sunrise Fnd to present the Ancient Law silent film w/ live Klezmer musicians. We collaborated with the Ruderman Fdn to document the JHJC challah-making event. Then we returned to hosting a Holocaust survivor, Estell Nadell, to speak to nearly 1,700 local students and residents.

Jackson Hole Public Art

In 2021 JH Public Art hired a world-renowned artist to create a giant troll sculpture made from recycled materials for Rendezvous Park. To celebrate this magical sculpture we provided creative, educational programs to over 400 students. We produced Glow Nights, a seasonal holiday program including the installation of 4 custom illuminated artworks in accessible locations. With local conservation groups we produced WildWalls, an annual mural event with educational augmented reality features. Last year we installed 1 new mural and 9 temporary murals and reached over 5,000 viewers. Sage Living opened with a beautiful and welcoming art collection of over 45 pieces designed for aging populations that JH Public Art helped curate. The Art Mobile delivered free art activities, food, and books to over 350 youth and 200 families received free art kits before the holidays. We installed 2 playful new ArtSpot sculptures seen by over 30,000 daily commuters. Support from Old Bill's Fun Run creates shared public art experiences that ignite imaginations and build a beautiful, sustainable, and vibrant community.

Jackson Hole Symphony Orchestra (JHSO)

This year JHSO held two large Free concerts and our two smaller chamber groups (Jackson Hole Brass Quintet and the JHSO String Quartet) are each having a concert of their own this summer, also free. We are so glad to be able to be rehearsing and growing our musical talents in person again after Covid. More thrilling is bringing our hard work to our audiences.

Jackson Hole Youth Orchestra/MusicLand

MusicLand intends to fill the gap with music education opportunities for this community. Our Jackson Hole Youth Orchestra (JHYO) program held planned concerts with opening for the Grand Teton Music Festival's Holiday concert and a holiday concert collaborative event with Cathedral Voices, Jackson Hole Symphony Orchestra, and the JH Brass Quintet this past December. Summer workshops are planned with the Grand Teton Music Festival and IMPROV camp with professional area musician, Jason Fritts which has expanded to include adults. Our new early childhood education program, MUSIC TOGETHER began in April with a Spring Session, 8-week program which currently services children from 0-4 years old and their families. This program has a research based developmentally appropriate early childhood music curriculum that strongly emphasizes and facilitates adult movement. Summer Music Together will be starting in July. We have serviced over 100 students,



their families, and participants with our programs. Our scholarship offerings have grown and now include a collaboration with ONE 22 to help with private instruction and Orchestral Participation.

Jazz Foundation of Jackson Hole

We are back into the "swing" of things! We are once again rehearsing regularly and exposing hundreds of locals and visitors to Big Band Jazz music through our public performances at no cost to them. We've recently added three solid new members who are able to play with us and get a personal experience with this style of music. We bring the Big Band to Jackson! People would need to travel hundreds of miles to see anything else like us, but thanks to our funding through Old Bill's they don't have to. This unique style of music is available free and frequently right here in Jackson!

KHOL 89.1 - Jackson Hole Community Radio

Our listenership is growing - both locally, regionally and nationally. Support from Old Bill's helps ensure that we are able to report on the stories that matter to listeners in our community. And we know the public is hungry for our in-depth coverage as our listenership (and web engagement) has grown sizably over the past few years (more than 500%) in just the last year it has grown 50%.

National Museum of Wildlife Art

The 2021 Old Bill's Fun Run grant supported the National Museum of Wildlife Art's operating and programmatic expenses. Last year's exhibitions included "National Geographic: 50 Greatest Wildlife Photographs," "Valued Species: Animals in the Art of Andy Warhol and Ai Weiwei," and a showcase featuring works created by local students. Other programs include Fables, Feathers & Fur, an interactive storytelling/artmaking experience for children (172 participants since May 2021), Make It Wild, a series of eight online art classes for adults, and First Sundays, a program that provides free admission and family-friendly activities for community members. To increase the accessibility of the Museum's offerings, the organization updated its infrastructure, provides interpretive signs and audio tours in English and Spanish (accessed by 2,287 visitors since May 2021), and offers complimentary colorblind glasses. The Museum is grateful for the continued support of the Community Foundation of Jackson Hole and Old Bill's Fun Run.

Off Square Theatre Company

Unrestricted funding made possible a triumphant return to gathering for live theatre experiences and theatre arts education at Off Square Theatre Company. By supporting facilities and administrative costs, funding from Old Bill's Fun Run made possible free performances for thousands of audience members at Thin Air Shakespeare, introduced hundreds of students to live theatre, and brought the community together for critical conversations. This funding enabled the creation of a new Technical Director position at OSTC which will support all future productions. We are especially proud of the growth of our theatre arts education program this year. Education at OSTC is focused on creating connections and helping youth build self-confidence and empathy. We provide a safe place for youth to grow, explore, and develop the skills needed to navigate the increasingly complex world.

pARTners

pARTners funds, designs and implements various creative and academic arts education programs by introducing local artists into Teton County classrooms. pARTners serves over 2,900 students in classrooms throughout Teton County. This year, we will have implemented 35 projects, helping teachers enhance their curriculum through the arts.

Riot Act, Inc.

Funds received through Old Bill's help us to bring live productions and programs to the Jackson stage. Our productions foster new and veteran theatre artists in our community. We also provide challenging theatre to



the Jackson audience. We offer many volunteer opportunities and open auditions for every production. We also offer discounts for students, seniors, and groups. Our productions over the last year included over 50 theatre artists and 1500 audience members. We could not produce quality of work we do without your support. Thank you.

Teton Artlab

Last year's Artist In Residence Program was hosted both in person and virtually during the height of the COVID outbreak. We hosted 7 artists from 6 states representing painting, printmaking, new media, sculpture, and film. We hosted 7 artist talks that were attended by 85 people in person and seen by nearly 8,000 people online. We were able to expand our ability to reach people via Facebook live talks, something we had never done before. We collaborated with the Art Association of Jackson Hole and the Anvil Hotel, who provided studio space, housing, and food stipends. Without this program, we would be unable to bring artists to the valley because of the extremely high costs of housing and space.

Teton Music School

Teton Music School unlocked a life of music for more than 200 youth and adult students through accessible individual instruction and group music classes with 14 professional music instructors in piano, drums, guitar, music production, songwriting, voice and more. TMS instructors and performers visited Teton County classrooms and the community reaching a diverse population of 1,200 more community members through exceptional music experiences, including music therapy for students with special needs, supplemental music instruction in the schools, and performances by student musicians.

Teton Trust for Historic Places

Old Bill's Fun Run 2021 supported the creation of Wyoming's only historic preservation easement program. As the Save the Block campaign ended, the historic Van Vleck Block buildings still needed protection, but a qualified historic easement organization didn't exist, and easement management funding wasn't available. This grant, combined with the volunteer expertise of our board members, made it possible to secure the three historic Van Vleck Block structures with three easement contracts. Furthermore, a Teton County historic preservation easement program is now available. The Teton Trust for Historic Places easement program offers complete historic preservation easement management services that accommodate the very special nature of Teton County while complying with national criteria and eligibility requirements. In June 2022, the Town of Jackson and our board will announce a historic preservation easement template. This contract template secures a fourth historic property in town and informs prospective easement clients.

The Jackson Hole Chorale

Last year's Old Bill's funding primarily assisted in retaining our Artistic Director and Accompanist during the post-COVID shutdown. When regrouped in person in mid-2021, the Chorale prepared its first-ever summer session, culminating in a free outdoor performance attended by over 100 guests at St. John's Church, enjoyed by locals and visitors alike. The organization has a digital keyboard, allowing for flexibility in performance locations throughout the community as well as providing the mechanism to record and post rehearsal "tracks" on the Chorale's website for vocalists to polish skills when not at a rehearsal. Created for each voice part, these support singers of all levels of musicianship. The Chorale presented 2021 Christmas and 2022 Spring Concerts, bringing joy in the preparation for the singers and excellent programming for our community guests. The organization will be celebrating its 40th anniversary this year and robust outreach for singers and audiences is our goal.

The Russian Club of Jackson Hole

There have been several hundred people attending and enjoying our events. Given the current war situation in Ukraine, we feel it is more important than ever to emphasize the value of Russian culture.



Vista 360°

Funding supported our Green Power Stimulus Plan program, which aims to use the arts and creativity to increase awareness of the need to transition to renewable energy in Teton County and, specifically, to enroll more people in the Lower Valley/Energy Conservation Works Green Power program. Our goal is to double enrollment from 15% to 30% by the end of 2022. Project includes a Solar Mural, a Youth Design Team (high school level) using public art to increase awareness and enrollment, art & environment classes in schools at all grade levels led by Artist-in-Residence Suzanne Morlock and an effort to negotiate the cost of Green Power for Teton County schools and a business partnership program. All these activities are ongoing and results will not be known until the end of 2022. We will measure outcomes through new enrollments in Green Power.

Whit Press

Whit Press creates books that weave a rich tapestry of literary diversity that put words into action for the public benefit. Old Bill's funding supports project design, printing, communication outreach, workshops, and readings. Old Bill's helps us with utilities, equipment, rent, to pay local vendors, and local salaries.

Wind River Foundation

The support of the Old Bill's Fun Run community of donors and contributors made a tremendous impact in the Wind River Foundation's organizational resilience and our ability to shift programming to address the impacts of Covid. Specifically, Old Bill's Fun Run support enabled us to endure the cancellation of our May 2020 event, from which we pivoted to reaching hundreds of people with uplifting connections in alternate venues. Two events in particular delivered on these goals: one in Teton Village in September 2021, and second, collaborating with the National Museum of Wildlife Art to reach 360 museum attendees in March 2022. In addition to these public events, we have been able to respond to and work alongside other local nonprofits and organizations. We are so thankful, and we look forward to this new phase of organizational transformation and growth in careful, measured steps and on solid footing.

Wyoming Humanities

Wyoming Humanities supports the cultural economy and infrastructure of Teton County through grants, programs, and partnerships with many non-profits in our Teton County. Our programs are free and open to the community. We encourage cultural diversity and inclusion.

Civic

American Legion, Jackson Hole Post #43

Provide Special Scholarship for boys baseball and girls softball Monument needs/updates and veteran's needs.

Cub Scout Pack 67

12 volunteer Adult leaders served as role models and mentors for 11 male and female Cubs grades K-5. The Adult leaders provided the youth with tools to learn skills that the Cub Scouts BSA program teaches. The program instills good moral values and leadership skills for life

Davey Jackson Chapter, National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution

The Old Bills funds donated to our society have enabled our nonprofit society to offer each year High School Scholarships, and a Good Citizen Award, chosen by the teachers. Our National Society in Washington D.C. sponsors a History Essay Contest for elementary students. Winning elementary students are represented at the State level, those chosen at state level are represented to the National level. Our Chapter gives monetary support for their representation to the State Conference in Wyoming with their parents. We have seen the local Teton



students blossom in their writing skills and are impressed in their knowledge and growth, which is an exciting contribution to the Teton county educators. We are so appreciative to receive the support of Old Bills, which enables the community support to our local students to excel to their highest ability and achievement.

First Responders Support Fund

Old Bill's Fun Run grant is used to provide training to our law enforcement community by providing the funds to assist with the cost of instructors and classes/

Global Ties Wyoming

Old Bill's enables Global Ties to sustain its efforts to bring citizen diplomacy to Teton County, WY.

Jackson Hole Center for Global Affairs

Support from Old Bill's gave JHCGA the vital organizational support to build our leadership efforts in global climate change initiatives through direct engagement with the Jackson Hole Community. JHCGA convenes stakeholders to create breakthroughs, particularly in climate action - the Jackson Hole Global Forum: Climate Change and National Security; the Jackson Hole Global Business Roundtable; and the Jackson, and Wyoming focused Coal Communities Roundtable. Further Old Bill's support provided JHCGA with the capacity for local nonprofits to combine forces around collaboration and potential merger activities and to continue to build impact and value-add content for the Jackson Hole community.

Jackson Hole Working

Old Bill's Fun Run grant provided Jackson Hole Working with the opportunity to continue our work addressing our community's housing, transportation, and overall goals. We have worked on affordable housing issues, participated in the Nexus Study, Tribal Trails, and more issues, assisting the valley in understanding how to get involved in their community and make their voice heard.

Jackson/Teton County Affordable Housing Department

Annually, the Housing Department serves thousands of community members through the creation of new affordable workforce homes, protection of existing workforce homes, and management of existing affordable workforce homes. All funds raised through Old Bill's Fun Run are being dedicated towards new unit development and are currently being allocated towards Jackson Street Apartments. This rental community will provide 57 homes to families and individuals in need at affordable rates ranging from very low income to moderate income levels.

Old Wilson Schoolhouse Community Center

The 2021 Old Bill's Fun Run grant allowed the Old Wilson Schoolhouse Community Center to perform necessary maintenance and repairs at the facility, including new paint, electrical and plumbing improvements, and refinishing our historic hardwood floors. We also used Old Bill's funds to spearhead and sponsor a new community program over the holiday season, the Community Gingerbread Exhibit, Scavenger Hunt and Raffle, which was well attended and received great feedback. Lastly, we used Old Bill's funds to pay the salary of our single staff member so that they could continue working to keep the schoolhouse beautiful, as well as maintain the facility as an affordable rental for our diverse array of user groups, which include numerous local non-profits, private citizens, HOAs, government entities, churches and the Pumpkin Patch preschool.

Rotary Club of Jackson Hole Foundation

Grahamstown South Africa water project supports education for roughly 5000 students. Teachers can work on areas of interest and continuing education - supports roughly 8 teacher grants per year. In April of 2022



our club awarded 42 students a total of \$206,000 for college, vocational and trade school support. Many of these scholarships are multi-year and the program has grown substantially over the last 10 years.

Santa Claus Fund

This past Christmas season 182 volunteers shopped and wrapped new toys and clothes for 591 of Jackson's children. The gifts were anonymously delivered, and we know that the Holiday season was happier for many families. "Santa" works closely with the Organizations of Care in Teton County to ensure that we find those who truly are in need and might not step forward on their own. If it were not for Old Bill's Fun Run we truly would not be able to give so much to so many at this special time of year. Thank you, Old Bill's!

Silicon Couloir

Silicon Couloir offers world-class programming for entrepreneurs and growth businesses in Teton County. The 2021 Old Bill's Fun Run grant funded our organizational and administrative support for our core programming, much of which remained virtual due to COVID: our free TEAMS mentor program licensed from MIT; our free monthly Chance Meetings networking events; vendor costs for our Annual Pitch Day which ran with a hybrid in-person/virtual format; managing the Cowork Space, which was deemed essential by Teton County, including expansion of the space to accommodate increased demand; and, finally, the 2021 Old Bill's grant supported administration of our Angel Investor program, which retooled in order to maintain a program that continued to support local start-ups, entrepreneurial ventures, and our local economy. Overall, the Old Bill's grant contributes to diversifying Teton County's economy as well supporting a thriving middle class for current and future generations.

Teton County Access to Justice Center

It doesn't matter that we live in one of the most beautiful and affluent places in the country. Domestic violence, evictions, and custody disputes occur on a daily basis. Thanks to the funds raised through Old Bill's Fun Run, the Teton County Access to Justice Center is providing legal representation and a voice to those who need it most. Old Bill's donations help provide representation for victims of domestic violence, translation services for the increasing population of non-English speakers in our community with their attorneys, and filing fees when people otherwise could not afford them.

Teton County Library Foundation & Friends

Old Bill's funding supports beloved programs & services at the Teton County Library each year, addressing a wide range of community needs. From educational programs for learners of all ages, to access to technology, meeting rooms, and print & digital materials, the library offers something for everyone, free of charge. Old Bill's funds supported the library in providing the following (and more!) in the past year: 118 Adult programs and 114 Youth & Teen programs at the Jackson & Alta branches; 2,351 books given away to adult & youth members of the community, and 57 Spanish-speaking outreach (off-site) events, reaching 931 community members. Post-Covid, the library has offered in-person, virtual, and hybrid versions of popular programs such as Page to the Podium, Story Time, Authors in the Schools, and College Prep workshops, as well as the Mountain Story Festival, Cabin Fever Story Slams, and Foreign Policy Discussion Series.

Teton County Sheriff's Auxiliary

Operational and training equipment, training, uniforms, educational programs that would not have been possible without the donations to the Teton County Sheriff's Auxiliary.

WyoFile - Teton County

With the help of Old Bill's Fun Run, WyoFile has informed and engaged the citizenry of Teton County and the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem by producing factual, in-depth, public-interest journalism. With more than 100 stories from the decisions made in Cheyenne, Rawlins, Washington, and Denver that have direct bearing on Teton



County's economic, civic, and environmental health, to events unfolding in our own backyards, WyoFile provided the community with the information it needs to participate in the democratic process, affect public land access and resource management decisions, and engage with civic institutions in the valley and beyond. Knowledge is power and WyoFile is proud to empower the community to define its own destiny. The community demonstrates its appreciation for this service and relies on it even more; as we doubled our newsroom capacity and broadened coverage areas, our readership has grown by almost 60% in the last year.

Conservation & Environment

Astoria Park Conservancy

With the support of over 150 families during Old Bill's 2021, Astoria Park Conservancy has provided a refuge for community relaxation and connection for over 100,000 visitors. Donations from Old Bill's allowed us to launch onsite wellness and education programs- providing essential experiences, requested by community members, such as hot springs meditations, swim lessons, and community conversations. We additionally were able to launch a no-questions-asked subsidized pricing policy for all of our programs to break down financial barriers of entry. Funds were utilized to plan for the future 100-acre park, expand our Access Fund, create ties with new partner organizations, and engage 2,500+ community members in ensuring Astoria is an accessible and safe space for all. We are grateful for the support of the co-challengers, the Community Foundation and our growing community of local supporters.

Charture Institute

The COVID-19 pandemic accelerated many of the trends rapidly shaping the future of Jackson Hole and the greater Tetons region, including increasing income inequality, increased pressure on workforce housing and community character, and mounting challenges to the region's environmental health. Thanks to the funding provided by Old Bill's Fun Run, Charture was able to keep abreast of these trends, evaluate their effects on the community, and work with local leaders to help develop ways to identify and address them. Put more succinctly, thanks to Old Bill's, Charture was able to continue its work to help the region continue co-thriving.

Craighead Beringia South

This grant allowed us to pay salary for our research biologist. This position performed several local wildlife studies, focused primarily on improving our ability to monitor and conserve wildlife. This included general surveys of mammals, birds, amphibians; a study on monitoring mountain lions; and research on improving noninvasive survey methods.

Energy Conservation Works

Exceeded \$1.6 million in total residential and commercial energy loans. Increased Green Power usage by >100% since 2018. Saved >3,900,000 through new conservation projects (More than 34,600,000 kwh cumulatively). Launched the Jackson Hole Power Challenge. Partnered to fund START's purchase of eight 100% Electric Busses. Distributed >2,200 Home Energy Kits to Lower Valley Energy members. Co-administered year one of the 'EV Experience', electric vehicle loaner program. Joined the Mountain Towns 2030 Net Zero Solutions Project. Supported the Teton Climate Action Planning process and led the Energy/Buildings sector team

Friends of the Bridger-Teton

Last year's Old Bill's Fun Run grant provided Friends of the Bridger-Teton the opportunity to hire additional staff devoted to the Ambassadors for Responsible Recreation Campaign. This support provided the expertise needed to secure a \$1.0 million grant from the JH Travel & Tourism Board to scale our visitor education & outreach campaign and grow our on-the-ground volunteer ambassador program.



Grand Teton National Park Foundation

Funding from Old Bill's Fun Run 2021 enabled Grand Teton National Park Foundation to provide financial support for projects and programs that enhance and protect Grand Teton's treasured resources. Initiatives supported by Old Bill's included wildlife and natural resources research, youth programming, volunteer education and outreach efforts, Snake River access improvements, and preservation at the Mormon Row Historic District.

Greater Yellowstone Coalition

Teton County is a key region in the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem containing the Bridger-Teton National Forest, Grand Teton National Park, Shoshone National Forest, rare and imperiled animal species such as grizzly bears, bison, wolves, and native trout, as well as some of the nation's most pristine waters. Funding from Old Bill's has allowed us to engage in multiple activities that help us to achieve our goal of preserving and protecting the lands, waters, and wildlife of this magnificent region. Specifically, we worked to ensure wildlife crossings are part of the corridor planning on WY Hwy 22/Idaho Hwy 33 (Teton Pass), inventoried 100 streams and 15 land units for the upcoming Bridger-Teton National Forest land-use planning process, protected elk winter habitat and migration routes, and implemented several conflict reduction projects that help keep bears and people safe, including adopting new land development regulations that protect wildlife from human feeding.

Jackson Community Recycling/Teton County ISWR

Donations supported measurable progress on the Road to Zero Waste. Initiatives include: increased participation in residential and commercial Zero Waste construction practices, participation in Zero Waste seminars, presentations, events and publications, and reinforce waste awareness and diversion through partnerships focused on Zero Waste demonstrations, as well as curriculum development. Collected 3,170 tons of recyclables from the community; Achieved a low 2.66% contamination rate among recyclables; Recycled and properly disposed of 138,000 pounds of Household Hazardous (HHW) and Electronic Waste despite a decrease in HHW facility hours due to staffing constraints; Initiated a food waste composting program and composted 30.35 tons of food waste; Achieved a 15% decrease in the amount of construction waste sent to landfill and increased wood waste for composting by 60%; and 4,100 total users utilized the Recycle Coach app to search 1,626 items on proper disposal and recycling options.

Jackson Hole Conservation Alliance

Old Bill's Fun Run is a chance for the entire community to make philanthropy a practice. Many of our donors only donate through Old Bill's, as they know their donations will be even more impactful. Old Bill's often introduces our organization to new donors. In 2021, this support allowed us to keep all of our programs running at full speed during the pandemic, maintain our level of staffing, and hire an additional grassroots organizer solely focused on protecting our public lands.

Jackson Hole Ducks Unlimited

As in years past, JHDU has been working in partnership with Ducks Unlimited National, and the Wyoming Game & Fish Department, to restore the South Park Feed Grounds. That project has broken ground, as of May 2022. Previous years Old Bill's Fun Run funds have been instrumental in bringing this project to fruition and we are excited about the Project's commencement. We are now pursuing a follow-up project in partnership with Ducks Unlimited National and Astoria Park Conservancy. This partnership has moved forward with the design phase of a new project on the Snake River Canyon, on property owned by the Astoria Park Conservancy, and involves the restoration of three ponds and one seasonal pond and the surrounding habitat, together with the potential for walking trails and educational components.



Jackson Hole Land Trust

Last year's Old Bill's Fun Run grant directly supported JHLT's land protection, stewardship, and community conservation initiatives in Teton County. Thanks to the support of generous donors and Co-Challengers, JHLT was able to steward more than 57,000 protected acres, complete 3 new land protection projects totaling over 290 acres and create connection through meaningful programs on our community conservation properties. Wildlife-friendly fencing was installed at the iconic Walton Ranch, in partnership with the Jackson Hole Wildlife Foundation. Community conservation properties such as R Park were activated by partnerships with Coombs Outdoors, Wyoming Game and Fish Department, and Jackson Hole Public Art, inviting diverse audiences of all ages to connect with nature. Staff and Board participated in professional development opportunities including communications and diversity, equity, and inclusion training.

Jackson Hole Wildlife Foundation

In 2021, Old Bill's Fun Run supported: 108 Moose Day volunteers, certification of 51 new Nature Mappers trained during five virtual seminars, advancement of the Being Wild Jackson Hole outreach campaign designed to strengthen visitor bonds to wildlife conservation, installation of 5 flashing radar signs to slow drivers on Highway 390, removal of wildlife hazards from South Highway 89 underpass, multiple fence removals on public and private lands totaling 16.1 miles of fence removed or improved, continued monitoring of 112 Mountain Bluebird nest boxes, extensive recreation and wildlife data collection through the Neighbors to Nature project with the goal to inform land managers, and much more!

Jackson Wild

COVID-19 changed the way Jackson Wild was able to interact with the local community. In order to maintain safety within the community we pivoted to mostly virtual programming along with a small, private event in September drawing in around 150 invited speakers, fellows and mentors. We also hosted our annual media lab where participants created 4 short promotional films for local organizations. As we (hopefully) begin to move away from Covid, we are looking to create more opportunities for the Jackson community to get involved with our work. This funding will help us create more opportunities to educate the local community on Jackson Wild's work and bridge the gap between the Jackson community and film community.

JH Climate Action Collective

Old Bill's Fun Run grant is enabling us to develop a Climate Action Roadmap for Teton County and participate in a statewide coalition for climate action in Wyoming. It is also enabling us to create communication tools (website/social media/press releases) to mobilize the Teton County community for climate action. We are also co-hosting speaker Jason McLennan (Living Buildings) for speaker/meetings in October.

LegacyWorks

It enabled us to engage in unfunded or under-funded work including designing and facilitating the Teton Climate Action Partnership (TCAP) collaborative planning process. TCAP enabled 71 individuals from 23 organizations and agencies from 12 fields to co-create TCAP's shared vision, principles, and purpose, identify more than 125 climate action opportunities, and weave closer collaborative ties with key partners. Partners are now prioritizing the most promising projects to catalyze. The tangible and intangible impact of these outcomes are incredibly important, particularly weaving 23 organizations into close collaboration on what matters most. As Alicia Cox of ytcleancities.org says, "The facilitation support provided by TCAP brought together the players that had been talking about collaboration for years, but needed a reason and structure to make it happen." TCAP has also primed the pump for major investment in equitable climate action, beginning with CFJH's grant to support the development of the TCAP dashboard.



National Parks Conservation Association

Old Bills Fun Run has been essential to the success of the NPCA Grand Teton Field office in support of projects and educational outreach to preserve the natural and cultural values of Grand Teton National Park. Funds raised are used to enhance the park's mission through informational and educational campaigns and in support of on-the-ground project work. Support through Old Bills allows NPCA to focus on projects that directly benefit the community and the park. Old Bills funding supports NPCA's overall program capacity and advances our campaigns that help to maintain wildlife migration corridors and safe wildlife crossings, preserve the park's clean air and water and advance the Zero Waste partnership that has diverted tons of trash from the park and landfill each year. These efforts are critical to preserve one of our country's crown jewels - Grand Teton National Park - for residents, visitors and future generations to enjoy.

Northern Rockies Conservation Cooperative (NRCC)

NRCC is a leading center for independent conservation projects in Teton County. This past year, our Research Associates advanced the scientific understanding of changes in our valley (e.g. Trevor Bloom's research on earlier flowering timing), implemented on-the-ground conservation measures (e.g. Nancy Bockino's work to collect rust-resistant whitebark pine seeds and monitor populations) and surveyed for local fauna (e.g. Andrew Ray and Debra Patla's monitoring of amphibians). We also published books on improving our collective conservation actions (e.g. Yellowstone's Survival: A Call to Action for a New Conservation Story by co-founder, Susan Clark) and the intrinsic value of wildlife told through art and storytelling (e.g. The Artist's Field Guide to Yellowstone by Artist-in-Resident, Katie Shepherd Christiansen). Additionally, we held the virtual Jackson Hole Wildlife Symposium to bring together experts and the public to better understand human-wildlife coexistence. All this work and more is supported by the Old Bill's Fun Run grant.

Protect Our Water Jackson Hole

In 2021, Protect Our Water Jackson Hole worked on the Steering Committee with the County and Town on selecting a consultant for the Teton County Water Quality Master Plan. We also worked on the Steering Committee to select a consultant for the Review of the Town of Jackson's Wastewater Plant Review Study. Both of these initiatives launched at the end of 2021. We have taken very critical steps with both of these large planning efforts in protecting the waters in Teton County. Lastly, POWJH did a considerable amount of community outreach educating the community about the adverse effects of wastewater, fertilizers, stormwater, and livestock.

Raynes Wildlife Fund, Meg and Bert

The Raynes Wildlife Fund provided 13 grants to universities and regional non-profits to further the understanding and stewardship of wildlife large and very small that depend on the Greater Yellowstone ecosystem. We supported up-and-coming researchers and seasoned biologists in this vital and innovative work in our world-renowned ecosystem.

Responsible Growth Coalition

This year, Responsible Growth Coalition continued its campaign to educate the public about induced demand - the concept that more roads encourage more vehicle miles traveled. Our weekly cartoons reached 10,500 readers and 2,000 community members online. Our messaging went deeper into the environmental impact that roads have on wildlife and wild spaces and the potential for other solutions that would remediate the potential for more traffic. We joined forces with the Conservation Alliance and helped them fund a Director of Transportation. We helped them host a party "FenFest" that aligned our interests in preventing the proposed Tribal Trail Connector from disturbing the sensitive wetlands known as a Fen. Fens take 1,000 years to create a biodiverse environment that supports hundreds of species. We attended Tribal Trail Connector open houses,



wrote newsletters and letters to the editor to oppose the proposed connector and researched alternatives that would offer more responsible transportation solutions for our valley. Now that COVID has allowed for more gatherings, we plan on attending the EcoFair and we look forward to seeing our community together at the Old Bill's Fun Run.

Riverwind Foundation

Old Bill's Fun Run provided funds for supporting the Jackson Hole & Yellowstone Sustainable Destination Program to (1) implement the BEST Sustainability Certification program for training and certifying those businesses and organizations most committed to sustainability, (2) conduct the Sustainable Business Leaders (formerly RRR Business Leaders) program with ~180 businesses and organizations (3) publish the Green Matters in Jackson Hole sustainability Magazine and Sustainable Business Guide distributed to over 7,800 subscribers, (4) research and report on solutions to visitor and resident impacts on our environment, community, and economy. Positive community impacts include reducing energy, fuel, and water use; lessen waste to the landfill; and reduce carbon emissions; improving air and water quality; protecting wildlife and wild lands; and growing the next generation of green leaders.

Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, Jackson Hole Chapter

1664 acres of prescribed fire and 472 of mechanical thinning that will reduce fuel in Caribou-Targhee National Forest to reduce the potential for an intense wildfire.

Sierra Club Wyoming

Although still constrained by the pandemic, we again partnered with the Forest Service to help provide 250 school children with educational materials in lieu of the annual in-person Blackrock Field Camp (still paused due to the pandemic). Through online programming, we virtually educated more than 250 residents on conservation issues impacting Teton County, and supported 30 volunteer leaders with training and skills development to support effective administrative advocacy on public land and wildlife issues in Teton County. Our supporters' investment in our work in Teton County through Old Bill's Fun Run is essential to helping us achieve our conservation goals in northwestern Wyoming, and we look forward to resuming in-person advocacy with on-the-ground staff working from a local office later this year, when it is fully safe to do so.

Snake River Fund

Old Bill's Fun Run funds have supported our stewardship and public access efforts in the upper Snake River watershed. These funds have been used to install a new streamgage and technology to better monitor water quantity and quality in our community. Funding has also been used to offset fundraising needs to cover our direct operational costs for our organization.

Teton Botanical Garden

Our use of Old Bill's Funds impacted over 100 students in the county schools through our school garden projects. Funds for the National Museum of Wildlife Art project helped reached hundreds of visitors to the Museum from all over the country and created educational materials on fire ecology. Other funds were used at Sage Living center to benefit residents and guest through beautification and client activities.

The Cougar Fund

As the community emerged from the unknown and isolation of the pandemic, The Cougar Fund found itself front and center as a focus for people seeking not only to visit Teton County physically, but also to discover online about conservation, wildlife, and the desire to connect to nature. Without Old Bill's Fun Run, we would be struggling to respond to the opportunities that we have throughout the year to actually get out in front of people and share fact-based messages about large carnivores. Our dedicated position, funded by Old Bill's presented to thousands of people pre-covid and last year that demand was more evident than ever before. Teton County draws



people to SEE, The Cougar Fund-through Old Bill-gives them a chance to also LEARN. Our school children and young people benefit from our programming every school year as our relationship with TCSD is wonderful. Thanks to you Old Bill's Fun Run!

The Nature Conservancy in Wyoming

Old Bills has empowered The Nature Conservancy in Wyoming to engage over 700 volunteer citizen scientists in Teton County in our "Wildflower Watch" program. This phenology work is focused on simultaneously teaching science while also generating research to support conservation across Teton County with land management agencies, private landowners and the public. Wildflower Watch is leading to a better understanding of the effects of climate change on the seasonal timing of ecological events, and empowering people to do something positive about it by contributing to research and restoration. Old Bills also supports "Neighbors to Nature", a collaboration with other nonprofits and the Bridger Teton National Forest to quantify recreation use and impact on the forest. TNC's continued focus on our "Fire on the Mountain" project integrates phenology and native plant restoration into a visible and publicly accessible program via the Greater Yellowstone Botanical Tour with our partners at the National Museum of Wildlife Art.

The Wilderness Society

Old Bill's helps The Wilderness Society in our mission to protect landscapes on the 3.4-million-acre Bridger-Teton National Forest; protect the public ownership of public lands; and provide agencies with public land management recommendations. We are currently working with a group of 18 conservation and outdoor recreation advocates who collaboratively develop conservation and recreation proposals as input for the Forest Service as it begins the revision of its forest management plan. We also work on projects of local interest such as the Grand Targhee expansion and protection of ungulate migration corridors. Old Bill's donations significantly enhance our ability to build coalitions with multiple local grassroots and grassroots organizations and help us develop relationships with local, state, and federal agencies. With your support, our goal of ensuring lasting protection for public land, will impact visitors to our county, over 22,000 Teton County residents, and many future generations.

Trout Unlimited - Jackson Hole Chapter #051

Old Bill's Fun Run remains essential to the Jackson Hole Chapter of Trout Unlimited's efforts to conserve, protect, and reconnect watersheds within Teton County through youth and community education, outreach and project work. In addition, Old Bill's Fun Run funds support a full-time dedicated staff position in collaboration with state and national TU organizations. Old Bill's funds supported the development and implementation of conservation projects on Spread Creek, South Flat Creek, Snake River, Lake Creek, Blackrock Creek, and Three Channel Spring Creek in Teton County. It also supported a conservation intern, Jackson Kids Fishing Day, the Jackson Adopt-a-Trout Youth Education program, and several community events. It allowed JHTU to respond to a community need to monitor the rapid ramp down of the Snake River in fall 2022, and engage volunteers in our work over the course of over 800 volunteers hours (planting willows, rescuing fish, monitoring, youth education). Old Bill's funds were leveraged at an over 1:12 ratio with federal, state, nonprofit, foundation, and private funding and in-kind contributions of materials and staff time.

Wyoming Alliance for Environmental Education

Due to Covid, all of our in-person programming was cancelled in 2021. We offered virtual trainings for which there was no expense. Even these had minimal enrollment due to the stress on educators during the pandemic. We used funds to support our operations while we worked on improving our communications strategy & marketing. Funds will be used in 2022 to offer workshops locally and provide on-line professional development courses.



Wyoming Outdoor Council

Old Bill's support allows our policy, legal, and science staff to advocate with state wildlife managers and decision makers against development proposals in big game migration corridors that provide seasonal habitat for wildlife that live in Teton County. It also supports our work to find a solution to the serious water quality problem in Teton County. We are continuing our work with local and state authorities to conduct and implement a Water Quality Master Plan for Teton County, as well as participating in stakeholder and public comment aspects of the plan. Funds also support our coalition work to prepare for the new Bridger-Teton revision plan. We are working to protect swaths of the forest from industrial use in order to protect conservation values today and for future generations.

Wyoming Untrapped

WU monitors trapping incidents and regulations, trail use, WGFD and WGFC meetings, and contacts agencies when needed to address concerns. WU's Trapping Incident Map (TIM) provides information and comfort to victims of accidental trapping. Sophisticated maps show details about each incident. Without TIM, incidents are not tracked and victims are not publicly recognized. With Covid-19 still a concern during 2021, WU transitioned its in-person Trap Release Workshop to a virtual training. These workshops have been integral in helping educate pet owners about traps and how to release a pet properly and safely if it is trapped or snared. The Untrap Pack provides a toolkit facilitating the release of dogs/people after accidental trapping. Packs are significantly discounted, subsidized with private donations, business partnerships, and assembled by volunteers. WU launched the Beaver Dam Cam, and the Beaver Coexistence Program, promoting awareness of these critical species and reducing the need for lethal trapping.

Wyoming Wetlands Society

The Wyoming Wetlands Society was able to use Old Bill's grant monies to benefit the community by giving multiple tours of our facilities and presentations at swan releases to spread education and enthusiasm for wildlife and the importance of wetlands. We installed floating nesting islands, repaired others, and provided nesting materials for wild swans throughout the Greater Yellowstone Ecosystem. We continue to live trap and relocate "problem" beavers from private property to areas where they can improve water retention on the land at vital headwater areas. Our wetlands improvement work benefits all users, wildlife and humans for future generations.

Wyoming Wilderness Association

Wyoming Wilderness Association's (WWA) work protecting our public wildlands in Teton County is possible because of the generous support from Old Bill's co-challengers and donors. As a grassroots organization, participating in Old Bill's brings vital resources to our mission - the donations and community support received throughout the giving season are foundational to growing our stewardship and educational programming. In 2021, we accrued over 1,900 volunteer hours collecting Solitude Monitoring data for the Bridger-Teton and Caribou-Targhee National Forests at twelve different locations. We also provided local high schools students with a free 10-day wilderness leadership program to find their voice for wilderness conservation and continued efforts with other regional partners to prepare for the upcoming Bridger-Teton Forest Plan revision. Old Bill's support allows us to maximize our impact, strengthen our community culture of conservation, and ensure future generations can experience and appreciate our wildlands and heritage.

Wyoming Wildlife Advocates

Funds raised at Old Bill's in 2021 were used to continue our outreach to the public using our free wildlife guides which are available throughout Teton County. We also ramped up our efforts to educate the community on how to coexist with wildlife, especially bears, and began to provide tools for residents to achieve effectively living alongside wildlife. This led to our creation of Jackson Hole Bear Solutions which is providing bear-resistant trash



cans to the residents regardless of ability to pay. Having the support of Old Bill's funds allows us to be a strong organization that runs strong programs. We are the voice of wildlife in Wyoming.

Wyoming Wildlife Federation

The contributions from the Old Bill's grant have allowed WWF to serve the community through ecology including working with local agencies on conservation issues, education and awareness events and outreach to Teton county residents, and the Hunters for the Hungry program connecting hunters to local food banks. Through these contributions, WWF has been able to expand our work in the coming year by planning summer camps for Teton county kids and working to expand our Wildlife on Tap scientific literacy series to Jackson.

Yellowstone-Teton Clean Cities

Last year was the 10th year of our Sustainability Series, this funding helps provide the resources necessary to collaborate with other local entities, Energy Conservation Works and Integrated Solid Waste and Recycling to educate the public on sustainable actions and programs. The funds also supported program development to educate consumers about electric vehicles and our continued support of business and government entities through our green fleets service.

Education

Bridger-Teton Avalanche Center Foundation

The funding provided enabled the Bridger-Teton Avalanche Center Foundation to support the daily operations of the Bridger-Teton Avalanche Center. Several million contacts are made each year to the avalanche center's website. In addition to funding daily operations this revenue paid for significant software updates to the center's database management software.

BSA Scouts - Pack 268

The funds received last year went a long ways to make scouting affordable to all who wanted to participate by purchasing derby cars, first aid supplies, covering entrance fees and more. They enabled the cub scouts to always be fed and equipped during their numerous volunteer events which included the elk antler pickup, Rylee Mccollum procession, town clean up day, flag day, canned food drive, and other events.

BSA Scouts - Troop 67

Prior years funds were used to give the scouts and outdoor experience involving cooking, camping and 100 mile river trip. Our troop hosts dinner at the mission and 2 Sunday morning breakfast at our meeting place, First Baptist Church for all members to attend.

BSA-Venture Crew 407

Last year's funding allowed us to purchase ski passes for 6 crew members so they could train with TCSAR in professional avalanche training throughout the winter. Having this training increases the number of people capable of responding in case of a real emergency.

Central Wyoming College - Jackson

Central Wyoming College has been serving the Teton County community for over forty-five years. We are committed to meeting the valley's educational and workforce needs and providing educational opportunities for locals from all walks of life. Our entrepreneurial approach to developing and delivering programs allows us to nimbly adapt to changing needs and provide outstanding service to Jackson and beyond. Education is the cornerstone of any society. A study commissioned by the state found that in Jackson, for every \$1 invested in education from CWC, on average, yields \$4.50 in benefits to the county. We are able to provide a brighter future



to individuals who already live and work in Teton County. We also provide 2- and 4-year degrees for everyone who is place-bound.

Chabad Jewish Center

This past year the Chabad Jewish Center invested time and resources for providing social, humanitarian and personal care for members of our community. We also built and upgraded our physical, virtual and web infrastructure to better serve our community for the long term. Thank you Old Bill's for enabling us to reach deeper and closer within the community.

Children's Learning Center

Old Bill's Fun Run is Children's Learning Center's largest annual fundraiser and "friend-raiser." With support through Old Bill's, we continued providing affordable, high-quality, inclusive childcare for local families across the economic spectrum (40% of CLC families receive tuition assistance). We served over 1,000 children through a continuum of early education programs, including Head Start, Early Head Start, childcare, and Special Education. We also provided more than 700 free developmental screenings and served nutritious, home-cooked meals and snacks to 170 children daily.

City Kids Wilderness Project

Through Old Bill's, 130 City Kids youth, ages 11-18 experience ranch camp and local internships, learning outdoor skills, teamwork, preparation, and goal-setting. These experiences translate into critical life skills that expand their sense of personal possibility. 97% of City Kids program graduates also graduate from high school and 92% enroll in college, earn a GED, or pursue other vocational programs.

CRS Memorial Scholarship Fund

The moneys generated by Old Bill's go directly back to the community through scholarships awarded to students from Teton County.

C-V Ranch Residential Treatment Facility

C Bar V is continuously looking to the future and remains committed in improving and enhancing the lives of our students. Last year, various operational expenses were alleviated with the help of Old Bill's funds. We can't thank Old Bill's enough for everything that it has done to help our organization.

Erin's Fund

Last year's Old Bill's grant was our biggest ever! We were able to award four, one-time scholarships of \$4,000 this Spring 2022!!

First in Family Jackson Hole Scholarship

The Old Bill's Fun Run Grant supported 22 local first generation youth and their families as they applied, enrolled, persisted, and worked towards college graduation during the 2021-2022 academic year. This summer, First in Family will celebrate its first 2 college graduates, and 12 rising high school seniors will join the program. First in Family also partners with other local organizations to encourage greater college enrollment and success for all local students with no family history of higher education.

Fund for Public Education - Teton County, WY

Support from Old Bill's continues to make a huge impact on how the Fund for Public Education is able to support students and teachers in the Teton County School District #1. Donations from Old Bill's funded early intervention reading recovery literacy programs, student mental health counseling services, teacher professional development, Spanish literacy in the classroom, and allowed us to co-administer \$900,000 in scholarships for



over 94 students through 225 individual Teton County Scholarship Program awards. This would not have been possible without the support of our incredible community. Thank you!

Geologists of Jackson Hole

Work in local schools to support teachers and provide education about the physical world around us. Bring speakers from regional universities and other organizations to speak twice per month about research related to our physical world, from the center of the earth to the literal end of the universe. Fund Jackson Hole High School graduate's college scholarships for earth science related majors.

Girl Scouts of Teton County

For the 2021-2022 school year, Girl Scouts of Teton County was able to start a new troop for grades K-2, buy some portable tables for our Girl Scout room, host some fun Girl Scout events, and partner with the Wind River Community Alliance to help them package art kits for reservation families.

Girls Actively Participating!

Old Bill's allowed GAP! to provide personal empowerment program sessions to elementary and middle school girls in our community throughout the school year. We served over 200 girls, delivering 7 in person after school program sessions which focused on building confidence, positive communication, body image, healthy relationships, boosting emotional intelligence, creating solid friendships, becoming brave over perfect, accepting challenges, self-discovery and creating community.

Grand Teton Association

Each year through Old Bill's GTA was able to help the snake river fund to educate the public around recreating responsibly, hire more people to help navigate the river and give access to those in need.

InterConnections 21

Funding from Old Bill's enabled IC21 to provide international educational opportunities to local students and community members. Now, more than ever, we need to connect with other people and places in an increasingly globalized world. IC21 engaged over 100 students and educators from eight regional schools in critical debate and collaborative problem solving at the 16th annual Teton County Model United Nations (TCMUN) conference. More than 100 community members attended a free public lecture by Kristjan Archer of Gallup, Inc. on "The Rise of Global Suffering and Well-being Inequality." The global pandemic has highlighted how critically important our work is by fostering a greater understanding of our interconnected world.

Jackson Hole Classical Academy

In 2021, JHCA transitioned to a Tiered Tuition model. This new model provides greater access for families, as tuition costs are now commensurate with their demonstrated financial abilities. Our 2021 Old Bill's charitable gifts comprised a portion of the \$620,500 in Tiered Tuition discounts offered in the 2021-2022 school year; 38% of students received these discounts. Our Tiered Tuition model is an important part of helping the Academy have a socially and economically diverse student body. The Academy does not discriminate based on gender, race, color, national or ethnic origin in the administration of its admissions policies or tiered tuition program. The enriching high-quality education that the Academy offers is a beneficial education option for our community.

Jackson Hole Child Care Helpers

We granted funds to local licensed preschool and child carers, serving more than 250 local families. Grants supported new educational curriculum, classroom/outdoor materials, hands-on learning tools, and expert



instructor led classes (e.g. music and cross country skiing lessons). These grants enable childcare providers to maintain high-quality programming and improve the educational experiences for early childhood learners.

Jackson Hole Children's Museum

Our STEAM, Afterschool, Summer Camp and Friday CREST programs have provided educational programs, out-of-school childcare, and social-emotional development opportunities to over 1000 children in the last 12 months, a critical service to our community. This year, in partnership with Teton Literacy Center, we've expanded our afterschool capacity from 142 students to 238 students with the goal of ensuring more working families have access to critical education services between the 3pm - 5pm time slot when parents are still working. The museum space has also served as a safe, playful and creative space for families to spend quality time together outside of the home, another critical but limited resource in our community. We continue to prioritize supporting parents, families, and children in this community through our hands-on exhibits and public programming.

Jackson Hole Community School

We give out scholarships ranging from \$2,000 to \$20,000 to families that have need based on our FAST applications. We use Old Bill's monies to cover some of that amount.

Jackson Hole Driving Foundation

The Jackson Driving Foundation started a little kids driving school and offer scholarships to students in need. Students learn the rules and signs of the road.

Jackson Hole Lacrosse Club

The Old Bill's Grant specifically enables Jackson Hole Lacrosse Club (JHLC) to hire and pay great coaches who are knowledgeable of the sport, strong role models, and teach life skills and character through coaching the sport of lacrosse. JHLC offers a variety of lacrosse programming in Jackson Hole for boys and girls from 1st-12th grade. The core programs are the Spring Season and Fall Season where JHLC offers at least one team at each age group: High School, 14U, 12U, 10U, 8U. The Spring 2020 Season was unfortunately cancelled, but JHLC did operate "Return to Play" practices during the month of June. JHLC also operated its most robust and highest level of participation Fall 2021 Season with over 200 participants. JHLC operates other programming including "Summer Pickup" (freeplay), free "TRYLAX" clinics, summer day camps, and "Special Guest Clinics" with professional players and/or college coaches. JHLC also hosts its annual Mountain Roundup Tournament every year, where over 50 teams from the Mountain West region come to Jackson Hole to play our teams in a fun lacrosse festival-style weekend jamboree.

Jackson Hole Shooting Sports Foundation

With the help of Old Bill's the Jackson Hole Shooting Sports Foundation was able to complete critical safety infrastructure. These funds also support operational costs, shotgun bay shelter and upkeep and helped to procure steel target sets. These facilities and targets are used by countless members of the community accounting for approx. 2400 user days.

Jackson Hole Ski Patrol Memorial Scholarship Fund

Old Bill's Fun Run grant allowed us to award college scholarship funds to a diverse group of eight local students whose future educational interests differed but their desire for higher education was resolute and purposeful. Their dreams and goals bolstered by our financial assistance.



Jackson Hole Writers

Without the Old Bill's Fun Run, Jackson Hole Writers could not continue to provide our community with excellent educational opportunities. In 2021, we held a 100% virtual writers conference, allowing us to survive through a difficult year, despite lower attendance?49 participants, about half of our normal amount. But those 49 students still learned from 24 working agents, editors and authors from around the country, and we consider that a great success, which is easy to quantify by reading the great feedback we received. Recently, in addition to Covid-19 concerns, hotel rooms and flights have become exponentially more expensive, plus faculty salaries have increased, which is necessary. We're considering moving our conference to either May or October in order to make it more affordable for our organization as well as our community. For these reasons, thank you for your generous support. We literally couldn't do it without you.

Levi Dowell Memorial Scholarship

The scholarship provided needed financial support to scholarship to a graduating senior.

Moose Corner Children's Academy

Grand Teton's youngest explores are building a knowledge and understanding of the world around them. These children are using innovation, construction, art, music, dance, building, writing, science, body, and soul to make their own theories to explain how their world works.

Native American Jump Start

Last year's 2021 Old Bill's Fun Run during Covid saved Native American Jump Start's 2021 program year & enabled us to fund 74 NAJS internships (26 from Wind River Reservation). We were able to establish our first Distinguished Alumni which was Jordan Dresser from the Wind River Reservation (current Chairman of the Northern Arapahoe Tribe). We also were able to produce the Wy PBS special cultural presentation Wacipi - My Dance, My Life filmed at the Center for the Arts.

P.E.O. Chapter BG

After a decline in applications, due to COVID, we are grateful to be back in a position of awarding funds to our scholarship applicants. We receive many applicants through CWC, and word of mouth has become a real tool for us. With our goal of supporting women to stay in Teton County with further education, we found great success in 21/22, thanks to our donors. We strive to remain in contact with our applicants.

Rocky Mountain Ministries

Thank you Mr. & Mrs. Old Bill, Community Foundation of JH and Fun Run donors for this wonderful grant! This was our second largest grant to date! From this year's grant, we provided 10 scholarships; we also hosted approximately 200 guests. Our organization also provides housing for our year-round employees and summer program volunteers which is a huge need in Teton County. Thank you so much for allowing us to be part of this amazing program for the non-profits of Teton County!

Rotary Breakfast Club of Jackson Hole

Old Bill's funds allowed us to support the Central Wyoming College Bridge to College and Career Program, which supports and nurtures students in the gap between high school and college or college and their career.

Rotary Supper Club Charitable Association

We were able to provide opportunities for local students and children of all ages to engage in programs that provide further education and social development.



Slow Food in the Tetons

In 2021 Slow Food strengthened our community food system, offered a variety of food-based educational opportunities, and grew programs and partnerships to increase access to locally produced food. We successfully reinvented the People's Market at the Center For the Arts with \$450,000 in overall farmer sales, contributing to a total of \$750,000 paid directly to farmers, ranchers, and food producers through Slow Food programs. We ran four Cooking & Farming Summer Camps and weekly online cooking classes during the school year. We opened a new Community Garden at The Grove and now manage 154 plots total, supported by an impressive 1,800 gardener volunteer hours. The Farm to Fork Festival was a success with keynote speaker Mark Bittman and a free 100% locally sourced lunch for 500 people. We capped off the year by launching the Teton Farmer Fund, which disbursed \$27,500 in grant funds to three local farms.

Snow King Volunteer Ski Patrol

Trough the donations and matching funds from last year's grant, we have been able to continue to hold quality training programs, purchase and update rescue training equipment, and support our instructor's continuing education.

Soroptimist International of Jackson Hole

Funds were used to support education of 4 women and on programs that enrich the lives of women and girls.

Targhee Music Camp

Due to the ongoing pandemic, the Targhee Music Camp has been on hiatus for two years. We look forward to August 2023 for our next camp and Old Bill's financial support the last two years has helped us continue to run and plan for the next camp, our 15th (used to be annual) Targhee Music Camp.

Ted Jonke Memorial Scholarship Fund

Three continuing education scholarships were awarded to Teton County students based on financial need, academic merit and participation in soccer.

Teton County 4-H

These funds supported fair awards for youth members and educational travel opportunities for local 4-H members. They also supported meaningful ongoing programs like shooting sports, sewing, and animal projects.

Teton Literacy Center

Funds were used to provide tutoring, enrichment and family literacy services to children and families in Teton County. All programs took place in Teton County. Funds provided direct services to children (preschool-high school age) and their families, supported staff salaries, purchased instructional materials, funded lesson planning and curriculum development time and supported professional development. Programs provided include: afterschool clubs K-8th grade, afterschool tutoring, volunteer training and workshops, preschool classes, family literacy events, parent workshops and classes, and home visits. TLC provides integrated family-centered programs that combine tutoring, enrichment, and family literacy services to children and parents. TLC is unique in providing the free resources, giving families the opportunity to increase their literacy in a safe, family-friendly environment. TLC served 449 students last year through tutoring, after school clubs and workshops, summer camps, literacy small groups, preschool classes, parent programs, and family literacy activities. Over the past 5 years we have served 2,750 students. TLC provided over 27,000 hours of free literacy support during the past year. Over 2,500 books were given to children and families to build at home libraries. We had 89 volunteers working with us and 100% of those volunteers surveyed expressed that they felt successful in improving their student's literacy skills and wish to continue tutoring.



Teton Science Schools

At Teton Science Schools, students experience place to understand the world and change the world for the better. This occurs through in-person, hands-on, project-based, and place-based learning. With the support from community members through Old Bill's Fun Run TSS has been able to continue offering transformative learning experiences for local community members and for learners from all over the world.

The Billy Frank Memorial Scholarship

For the graduating class of 2022, we provided (11) \$2,000 scholarships to be used for both the students' freshman and sophomore years of college, \$1000 for freshman year, \$1000 for sophomore year. These students were selected based on their response to our essay question provided in our application. Each student showed a level of maturity, compassion, ambition and drive to move forward with their educational goals and to give back to society in a meaningful way.

Transcendental Meditation Center of Jackson Hole

The funds raised through Old Bill's have enabled us to offer Transcendental Meditation at a reduced rate to dozens of local individuals with financial need, to offer remote enrichment, and to maintain the necessary facilities to provide our services.

Troop-418061

Old Bill's is our largest fundraiser. Our organization was greatly impacted by Covid restrictions as far as traditional fundraising. We use the money that we receive to finance our troop's activities including campouts, summer camps, merit badges, advancement ceremonies among so many other things. We have both a girls and a boys troops and we offer so many activities and community services opportunities for them. These rewarding experiences really help to shape the youth of our community in a positive way. This would not be possible without old bills.

Womentum, Inc

Old Bill's Fun Run grant money provides the funds necessary to keep our organization vibrant and able to serve our community with personal and professional development opportunities for women. Despite the challenges associated with Covid-19, Womentum was able to serve over 1000 participants in 2021 through our signature mentoring program, on-line and in-person educational workshops, and our annual Women in Leadership Summit. In addition, Womentum's continued growth initiated a strategic planning session and the decision to shift our organizational structure to a salaried Executive Director and part time Asst. Director so that we may expand our programming to support the 450 women who make up our Womentoring alumnae community. Now more than ever, Womentum has learned that women in Jackson Hole are craving networking opportunities, building community, and engaging in growth opportunities. As we support these women, they improve the organizations and businesses they serve.

Wonder Institute (Center of Wonder)

Old Bill's funds allowed us to provide much needed programming, creative education, mentorship, and a vibrant space for our youth. This year, Wonder Institute established a Maker Space, digital media lab and a Robotics Lab equipped with equipment such as a CNC Router, a 3D printer, digital filmmaking cameras and a drone. In partnership with TCSD, over 500 students participated in a robotics program. Other programs include digital media, the We the People civic education program, and the national Stock Market game.



Wyoming Stargazing

The funding we received from Old Bill's Fun Run in 2020 supported 105 public astronomy programs including public stargazing programs, virtual astronomy programming, and indoor presentations for over 1,000 people, including over 350 students.

Young Eagles Flight Training Scholarship

We have provided local high school students the opportunity to achieve their dream of becoming a Private Pilot.

Health & Human Services

Becoming Jackson Whole

With funds raised during Old Bill's 2021, Becoming Jackson Whole carried out strategy and planning to launch a first-of-its-kind mindfulness immersion (ongoing) for local law enforcement. We expanded our community outreach with readily accessible tools that address mental wellness, increasing our Daily Acts emails from five to seven days weekly to share practices proven to cultivate mental wellness with 3,000 members of our community. We prepared a series of eight columns on practical applications of mindfulness running in the Jackson Hole News&Guide in 2022. We trained nearly 60 community members, primarily first responders and mental health providers, in the research-backed Mindfulness-Based Attention Training (MBAT) curriculum. We also cultivated our group of local MBAT trainers with check-ins, coaching, and opportunities to guide practices and facilitate community discussions. We partnered with the new peer-to-peer support program Whole Connections to help guide the launch and development of this innovative approach to community wellness.

Brain Chemistry Labs

A major initiative at the Brain Chemistry Labs is to find a cause for neurodegenerative diseases. With the grant support from Old Bill's Fun Run 2021, the Brain Chemistry Labs was able to use funds that would have been used to pay for rent and lab maintenance, and instead provide additional lab supplies needed to perform the scientific research which we hope will lead to the discovery of the cause and possible treatment of Alzheimer's, ALS, and Parkinson's disease.

Blue Medical Group

Funding from Old Bill's provided gynecologic services and birth control (primarily IUDs) at no or minimal cost to the patient. This funding specifically assesses women who are uninsured, underinsured, or have high deductibles. This funding help approximately 350 women who live and/or work in Teton County.

Children's Grand Adventure

In addition to having brought and facilitated over 100+ patient campers in person, now with the addition of our virtual format we are able to perpetually 'bring' and continue to serve innumerable children and supporters, without limit to geography, immunity, emotional or physical capacity, into our local area, which has proved to be impactful beyond imagination! With respect to the addition, development, and implementation of our virtual format, our community and other local non-profit partners continue to amaze us all with degrees of collaborative support for the delivery of 'Healing Through Exploration', through both the in-person and virtual opportunities for our kids. This has allowed for the visibility, connection, and further interactive exposure of the powerful inspiration of our local community, partners, and surroundings to be brought into a multitude of communities, all from the base of the Tetons. As well, The Children's Grand Adventure continuously and extensively partners with local community organizations, businesses, and other non-profits in the creation, collaboration, and development



of all of our critical programs, including extending coordinated efforts of strong and cohesive local partnerships in supporting our medical communities.

Climb Wyoming

Since the COVID-19 pandemic greatly impacted single mother families, Climb staff are there every day as moms struggle with stability, reconnect to social networks, and recover from employment loss. Connecting to resources within the community is critical as families seek stabilization during difficult times. During the past year, staff met with 62 candidates and 30 graduates to ensure they meet basic needs, while offering advocacy, parenting skills, mental health, and employment support. The Teton site continues to offer programs safely including Professional Office Careers and Commercial Driver's License. These career trainings serve 24 total participants while filling critical workforce demands. Focusing on each person's barriers has resulted in a 100% completion rate. Graduates are earning an average monthly wage of \$2,990, an 137% increase from pre-to post-program. Beyond career, technical, and life skills, the program offers individual and group counseling, needs that have increased during the pandemic.

Community Bible Church

The impact of Old Bill's 2021 has been a blessing to CBC. It continues to give us the extra funds to help those in need in our community. We are continuing to help over 20 families in this extended time of covid and with rising costs of food, gas and housing.

Community Entry Services

Funds were used to offset the increasing costs related to staff salaries and health insurance benefits. The most pressing need for Community Entry Services is the ability to hire and retain qualified staff to provide necessary supervision, supports and training twenty-four hours a day, 365 days a year to vulnerable adults with intellectual/developmental disabilities and acquired brain injuries. Without staff these individuals would not be able to receive services to include 24/7 transportation, affordable housing, medical and therapy coordination, job training and support, academic training, benefit management, recreational opportunities or social skills training. It is imperative that Community Entry Services be able to compete in a very competitive job market in a very high paying community such as Jackson. In fact, some individuals would not be able to remain in the Jackson community if Community Entry Services cannot afford higher wages for staff.

Community Housing Trust

Unprecedented support through Old Bill's Fun Run in 2021 allowed the Community Housing Trust to invest in the project management capacity of the organization with the addition of a highly qualified senior analyst. In the face of a housing crisis that affects every sector of our community, this investment, coupled with three transformative capital gifts, allowed the Community Housing Trust to embark on the design and development of three projects, acquire a fourth property and put a fifth property under contract. Without question, this amount of new project development and land acquisition would never have been possible without the people we now have on staff. Upon project completion, these five projects will provide stable, affordable housing for over 200 people. Affordable housing supports the work of every organization that we rely on by ensuring the people who deliver essential services have stable, secure housing.

Community Safety Network

Each year, Community Safety Network supports hundreds of survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and stalking with individualized, confidential, and free services including safe housing, advocacy, and legal aid, and therapeutic support groups. We reach thousands more through our community education and prevention program. In the past year, our services have been as essential as ever, as pandemic stress compounds on survivors' other stresses - housing, childcare, steady employment, and feeding their families, to name a few. In the past two years, our helpline calls have doubled. In the past year, our emergency housing hasn't seen a break. The



housing crisis affects survivors and those experiencing gender-based violence in a very real, dangerous way. Still, Community Safety Network has never turned away a client in need of safe housing.

Cultivate Ability

2021 was a pivotal year for Cultivate Ability as we embarked on piloting three new programs to promote disability awareness and inclusion in workplaces and our greater community. Funds from Old Bill's Fun Run allowed us to keep crucial staff to ensure our programmatic success. We were able to serve over 350 people in 2021 and 2022 continues this forward momentum!

Curran Seeley Foundation

The COVID-19 pandemic continued to have a drastic effect on our community's substance use treatment needs and the ability to provide services. Our agency provided the majority of services via telehealth. We were still able to see over 300 clients for assessments and treatment and saw 85 clients in our state-certified DUI class. The Too Good for Drugs prevention program was slowed significantly due to restrictions in the classroom as well as a lack of staff but we were able to see most 6, 7 and 8th graders this year.

Environmental Health Trust

EHT continues to offer online education on why and how to use technology safely, hosting online events with expert scientists and expanding YouTube videos and continuing the Jackson Hole Environmental Health Film Festival to inspire with powerful documentaries. Our work with local educators, teachers, parents and health professionals through social media and informational newsletters extends to an audience of approximately 20,000 persons. We are focusing locally on raising more awareness regarding impacts to the environment, bees, trees, etc., by championing efforts to protect the wilderness, sharing the latest science related to the increased energy consumption of 5G, and the impacts to trees, bees and wildlife. We continue in our efforts to oppose the National Parks planned telecommunications expansion in Grand Teton National Park and Yellowstone. Working with Yale University we will expand to offer accredited CME in Teton County & online.

First Baptist Church

100% of our Old Bill's funds go directly into our Benevolence account. This account is used by our pastors and staff to meet the needs of families/individuals with emergency housing, food, medical, transportation, and other financial needs. This past year has been difficult for many of the local residents. Especially in the area of housing and transportation. Everyday expenses are skyrocketing and we do our best to help. Thankfully, because of increased giving, we are able to help more and more people. This year we helped a lifelong resident maintain her housing and repair her teeth after a painful accident, single mothers escape dangerous relationships, pay for utilities to remain on, and so much more.

Friends of the Jackson Mounted Patrol

The volunteers of the Citizens Mounted Unit, funded by Friends of the Jackson Mounted Patrol, impacted the community in six ways in 2021/22: 1) We gave a western feeling to the Town Square when on duty. Tourists loved us! 2) Volunteers on patrol set the example by wearing their face masks as a visual reminder to visitors to wear theirs. 3) We aided the Jackson Police Department by being an extra set of eyes and ears on or near the town square. 4) We assisted in traffic control for the Rylee McCollum procession, as well as the July 4th parade. 5) The Police Department's mission statement includes the phrase "Western Heritage, Community Pride". The Citizens Mounted Unit (supported by FJMP) exemplifies this statement by keeping the Western Heritage alive by patrolling throughout the summer downtown from horseback. 6) Just this week (4/30/22), the Citizens Mounted Unit was asked to assist in the parking of Elk Antler Shed hunters that lined up a day early in order to escorted to the elk refuge on opening morning. Old Bill's allows our unit to purchase uniforms, equipment and training necessary to "Ride For The Brand" - our beloved Jackson Hole.



Good Samaritan Mission

Without the funding we could not have provided 3,950 nights of stay, given out over 40,000 pounds of food, or served 3,831 meals to our guests and the community.

Habitat for Humanity of the Greater Teton Area

The funds received from Old Bill's in 2021 are critical to Habitat's ability to offer programs and build homes. Funding supports overhead expenses such as salaries, staff training, homeowner services, office and construction site expenses, volunteer recognition, and more. Habitat was able to wrap up construction at the Grove which put eight more families in sustainable housing plus repurchase and refurbish three of our homes which now house two single moms each with three kids and a young couple with one child. Funding supported the costs of homeowner selection, administer homebuyer education and facilitate affordable home sales. Our volunteer program significantly reduces our construction costs and builds community by putting neighbors together to build neighborhoods.

Hole Food Rescue

Funding from Old Bill's 2021 allowed Hole Food Rescue (HFR) to extend its current programs and increase accessibility to healthy food within our community. In 2021, HFR rescued 283,842 pounds of food and distributed it to those most vulnerable in Jackson. This is a 57% increase from what we rescued in 2020. The funding also encouraged growth and expansion in our Food for the Community // Comida de la Comunidad programs from six to eight distribution sites, seeing over 10,000 visits from community members. Lastly, Old Bill's assets helped us continue our mission to eradicate child hunger in Teton County. We currently have 87 children enrolled in our Sprout Weekend Food Bags program (a 63% increase from last year) in which we deliver snacks and easy to make meals to children that may be experiencing food insecurity over the weekend.

Honoring Our Veterans

The funds we receive from Old Bill's Fun Run help us bring combat wounded Veterans to Jackson for week-long recreational rehabilitation therapy sessions. By maximizing the healing potential of nature, we assist Veterans as they move forward along their path to recovery by providing them with activities that increase confidence, improve both fine and gross motor skills, improve concentration, build trust, and help with the process of reintegrating into society.

Horse Warriors

Thanks to the incredible generosity last year we were able to serve 82 new students in our youth and adult programs. We doubled our mental health support in order to assist students transitioning back to in-person relating, post Covid. We increased our P/T staff by one person in the fall to help our director heal from a serious injury. Funding helped pay for staff planning and program support time, including pro-bono programming for students from the Community School in our CORE program. It offset significant costs of supplements for our aging horse herd, repaired our 4-wheeler that we use daily to feed horses, and helped provide in-house scholarships for 7 students. It also helped pay for some of the gas used to transport horses and students.

Immigrant Hope

In 2020, Immigrant Hope provided application assistance for 49 applicants and provided 44 consultations for forms of immigration relief, for a total of 93 people helped. The largest number of those applications were DACA Renewals and Green Card applications. By providing a legal pathway to citizenship for one person, the whole family benefits as does Jackson Hole. Each individual who is able to attain legal status is another person who can



legally work, drive, pay taxes, and participate more fully in the community. It also provides a huge measure of stability to affected families. No longer is the family fearful of what will happen to them.

Jackson Hole Community Counseling Center

The pandemic has not only increased mental health issues in our community but also shows the cracks in the system from prior years and consistent funding decreases. It has put an incredible strain on community members who need treatment as well as adding stress to the providers working tirelessly to address the growing demand. Without the funds raised through old bills, our agency, community and staff members would not be in a position to receive and give affordable and quality treatment services to our most vulnerable community members.

Jackson Hole Farmers Market on the Town Square

The Old Bill's Fun Run grant helps the Jackson Hole Farmers Market stay up and running to serve our community with fresh and local produce throughout the summer and winter. Being able to operate during a pandemic last year and give back to the community through our non-profit highlight booth each Saturday and help each vendor keep their businesses open and thriving was a huge goal and win for us. Having these funds keeps us operating so we can provide a wonderful community event to Jackson Hole.

Jackson Hole Fire/EMS

The donations received from Old Bill's have a direct impact on approximately 80 volunteer Fire/EMS members across Teton Co. WY. With these funds we advance our education, recruitment and retention, and we are able to work in a safe manner due to the purchase of new personal protective gear. This training, education, and equipment allows us to respond quickly and safely to all emergencies in Teton County.

Jackson Hole Search Dogs

Jackson Hole Search Dog teams deployed on a variety of missions last year in Wyoming and surrounding states including Idaho, Utah, and Washington. To assist in the recovery of loved ones and closure provided to family and friends is a profound opportunity for our teams. Teams train year-round in and around the town of Jackson, public lands provide important opportunities; often teams use the streets of town for tracking purposes in the winter, maintaining our skills for the busy spring summer and fall seasons.

Jackson Hole Therapeutic Riding

Old Bill's funds enable Jackson Hole Therapeutic Riding to adapt to unforeseen circumstances and the evolving needs of our clientele. Year after year, Old Bill's allows us to sustain impactful programs, develop innovative services, advance instructor proficiency, maintain healthy, happy horses, and empower the abilities of hundreds.

Kiwanis Club of Jackson Hole

Kiwanis takes our responsibilities to the community very seriously. We annually award two (some years three) scholarships to Jackson High School graduating seniors who are members of the Key Club and who have demonstrated outstanding volunteer work for the citizens of Jackson. We have extended this idea of scholarships to fund summer program memberships for children here in the Valley through The Avery Matthieu scholarship at the Art Association of Jackson Hole, GAP and other non-profits that run summer programs. We usually spend the entire amount that we get from Old Bill's each year on these types of scholarships, plus purchasing child car seats as needed, through Public Health, and the Fire department. We regularly purchase several cases of diapers for the Cupboard to distribute. The school nurse has identified several children who need extensive dental work, and we have given, and are currently giving, money for this. An estimate the number of children served - 15-20 through



the various scholarships, 4 in the dental department, 40 car seats, and the parents whose children are provided diapers. There are many under-served children in Jackson Hole, and our Kiwanis Club strives to meet their needs.

Lions Club of Jackson Hole

Between Oct., 2021 and May, 2022, the Jackson Hole Lions Club assisted more than 2500 Teton County (public and private) school students with eye and hearing screening through the donation of and continued maintenance of eye screening and hearing screening machines donated to schools in Teton County. Lions provided 62 individual students with vouchers for financial assistance for eye care prevention or eye sight restoration. Lions provided financial assistance (vouchers) for 6 adults through our partnership with One22, which provides safe, secure, confidential financial evaluations and assessments. Lions Club continues to provide annual maintenance of eye and hearing screening equipment. A small amount of the funds were used to send recycled eye glasses collected from 14 locations in Jackson and Wilson to the Rawlins Collection Center for cleaning, prescription determination, and packaging for redistribution outside of the U.S. in a partnership with Doctors without Borders. "WE SERVE"

One22 Resource Center

The funds raised through Old Bill's Fun Run each year support One22 Resource Center's mission to invest in and support our neighbors who face financial and cultural challenges. Last year, our team served 1,611 households, representing 2,063 individual members of our community. One22 provided more than \$1.3 million in support to local households with rent, childcare, and other critical needs. Through the Jackson Cupboard, our food access program distributed 414,087 pounds of food in 8,557 shopping visits. Funds raised through Old Bill's Fun Run bolstered our program development efforts, and provided critical funding for our operations, including personnel expenses, professional services, and technical support. As we hone our program focus and outcomes this year, this support has been critical in our efforts to streamline organizational processes and procedures to stay nimble in a challenging environment.

Our Lady of the Mountains- Hearts for the Hungry Community Lunch

We serve the disadvantaged and poverty-stricken in our community. We provided over 3,500 meals in 2022. Although our numbers are not sizeable there is a regular group who depend on us for their daily meal. In the high season, we welcome transients and those new to the community. We actively work to bring hope and stability to the life of our guests. Hearts for the Hungry will now serve according to situational needs, not just by meal. Our goal is to feed bellies and warm hearts while restoring a sense of freedom to the individual. Without the help of the Community foundation this program would not be available to all these people.

Pioneer Homestead Apartments

Pioneer Homestead Apartments is comprised of 3 buildings totaling 78 units providing housing for 78-83 low-income senior citizens. Keeping the buildings and grounds well-maintained while keeping rents low is challenging in light of the increasing labor & material costs. Pioneer Homestead Apartments allow the residents to continue living in the area and be near family. The monies from 2021 were very important to our efforts to ensure 25 apartments in PH Building 1 (the oldest one) meet current fire codes. In 2022-23, roof & gutter repairs and replacement of 10 water heaters is planned, so there is always a need for your support.

Presbyterian Church of Jackson Hole

PCJH uses these funds to help the needy in our community and to provide non-religious programs for children, youth, and families. In response to the Covid crisis we provided 3,204 take-out meals to the community in 2021. We provided safe preschool for 45 children weekly. Summer camp had 50 campers per day. The Big 5 drive



provided over 500 winter clothing items to community children. We served additional families through our after-school program and the Music Academy.

Senior Center of Jackson Hole

Old Bill's Fun Run funds make it possible for us to help seniors age in place, safely, in their homes in Teton County. We served 1,155 seniors last year and 82 non-seniors with meals, home care, transportation and activities. We could not have done this without the donations raised through Old Bill's Fun Run.

Shepherd of the Mountains Lutheran Church

We gave Smith's food and gas gift cards to needy families. We paid the electric and heating bills for several households in Teton County that Lower Valley Energy was going to shut off their power and heat to.

Special Olympics Wyoming

Over 200 Teton County athletes, partners, coaches and volunteers are actively registered with Special Olympics Wyoming. High caliber Teton County volunteers help to provide a quality experience for our athletes, promote physical activity, physical fitness and in turn promotes inclusion and acceptance in the community.

St. John's Episcopal Church Jackson Hole

Thanks to the generosity of Old Bill's in 2021, St. John's Episcopal Church was able to spread love into the community of Jackson Hole in a myriad of ways. We supported community involvement in the arts by hosting writing camps for children, a poetry festival, and a bluegrass concert with a picnic on our campus green space. We brought joy to children and adults alike with our Ice Cream Bike, giving away free ice cream treats throughout the summer. We bought and distributed Christmas gifts and grocery coupons for elderly community members. Old Bill's donations helped us to help organizations and individuals through funding, transportation support, and food, laundry, and housing programs. We were also able to provide direct assistance to local individuals and families. We used some of the funds we received to help defray our costs of providing the use of our facilities for community nonprofits. Thank you, Old Bill's, for helping us help Jackson Hole.

St. John's Health Foundation

It takes an exceptional community hospital to support an extraordinary community. And it takes an extraordinary community to support an exceptional community hospital. Our role at the Foundation is to reinforce that relationship by raising funds for programs that enhance and advance our hospital's services, capabilities, and capacities. St. John's Health serves more than 20,000 community members and is here for 2.5 million visitors each year. This year all unrestricted gifts were put toward St. John's Health's most important needs.

Stripping for a Cure

We are beyond grateful for the support of our generous community. Because of Old Bill's, Stripping for a Cure was able to donate to both the Women's Health Care Fund and the new Cancer Survivorship Fund at St. John's Health Foundation. Old Bill's helped us exceed donation goals and serve our cancer community at a higher level than ever. Thank you, Community Foundation!

Teton Adaptive Sports

Last year's grant from Old Bill's was crucial in funding our fixed costs of rent and staff salaries. This allowed our staff to focus efforts on programming, training and equipment that go directly to participants. We



also identified a need to provide employee housing benefits to retain staff. Consistent support from Old Bill's allows us to budget and plan our annual operations and staffing effectively to best support people with disabilities in Teton County!

Teton County Family Planning & Reproductive/Sexual Health Services

From November 2021 to the present, Teton County Family Planning and Reproductive/Sexual Health Services has continued to operate under significant limitations to clinic operations posed by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Our services included many clients with the high levels of acuity, including cases involving domestic violence, drug abuse, sexual assault and mental health issues, which continued to present in the population we serve. Despite the need, at times, to triage clients requesting appointments to those with greater acuity, our program supported clients at more than 1000 visits, sometimes conducted using telehealth. To further address community requests, our 2022 Old Bill's Fun Run application seeks to expand utilization of funds received to include salaries for two nurse practitioners for a 6-hour afternoon/evening clinic and a second 8-hour clinic, the original clinic still being supported by St. John's Health. During the coming year, we plan to implement a point-of-care ultrasound program to improve IUD insertion/removal efficiency and safety by purchasing at least one device with its required operating subscription.

Teton County Pet Partners

Teton County Pet Partners puts smiles on senior's faces, eases hospital patients' pain and helps kids read. The funding we received allowed us to offer four team evaluations to continue to build and maintain the number of active teams (30) we have in the community. It also helped up improve our communication and ability to track teams through a new database. Anxiety was high due to COVID 19, creating a booming demand for our services. We were able to provide support to seven facilities we've had relationships with for years and three new ones.

Teton County Search and Rescue Foundation

In 2021, TCSAR responded to 105 calls for service, making it the team's busiest rescue year ever. In all, TCSAR volunteers spent 6,195 hours on rescues, 10,842 hours training, and 542 hours at community events. The team also brought on the first new class of volunteers since 2015. TCSAR Foundation educated over 1,000 people through the Wyoming Snow and Avalanche workshop, 1,100 people through programing and outreach of Backcountry Zero, and thousands more through The Fine Line podcast. Old Bill's funding and the Teton County Search and Rescue Foundation supports volunteers who serve our community by saving lives and teaching best practices in the backcountry.

Teton County Victim Services

Old Bill's Funds helped put two victims through the trial process. Teton County Victim Services was able to assist at least 10 families with hotel stays this past January when a fire forced evacuation of a local housing complex. This allowed the families a place to stay until the Red Cross arrived in town. TCVS was able to assist 4 survivors of traumatic death with either hotel, advocate support, or follow up services. Several victims of stalking and domestic violence were provided pepper spray for their personal safety. A victim of domestic violence had their glasses replaced after they were destroyed in a domestic violence incident and were subsequently taken into evidence. Two advocates will be attending the Dallas Crimes Against Women Conference, which will allow them to increase their skills and abilities to respond to critical incident events and violent crimes. Two advocates will be attending Spanish Immersion School to enhance and gain more fluidity in speaking and serving our Spanish speaking victims of crime. It is anticipated that funds will be used in the next month to facilitate a victims return to Teton County to participate in a trial related to a domestic violence incident.



Teton Free Clinic

The Teton Free Clinic believes that everyone has the right to receive medical care regardless of their ability to pay. We understand the challenge faced by those who work in a seasonal community where most are not provided with health insurance, creating a barrier to accessing medical care. The clinic is open 2 days per week and provides care to more than 1000 patient visits annually. One of our goals is to keep non-emergent patients out of the emergency room. Our patients are provided consultations, medications, diagnostic studies, and supplies for the management of diabetes, heart disease and hypertension.

Teton Youth and Family Services

Our services saw a 40% increase in need in 2021. The impact this has had includes: 9805 safe bed nights for youth in our residential programs, Services to 670 children and family members, 85% of youth served in the residential programs do not go on to higher levels of care, Mentoring, empowerment, advocacy, therapy, asset building, suicide prevention, education, community service, relationship building. These efforts help children and families never reach the more intense levels of support our program offers. Connecting with a child, young adult, or family at the right time can truly make a lifetime of difference.

The Spread the Love Commission

Funding received from Old Bill's allows us to be more dynamic with local issues by building effective partnerships with other local organizations to increase our reach and impact. It also allows us to have a larger stockpile of supplies on hand for distributions as part of our client services due to our increased size of office and storage space. These partnerships, resources, and additional supplies allowed us to quickly and directly address the increased needs of the vulnerable in our community during the last two years of the pandemic as well as the rising cost of living in Teton County for our local workforce. Since March of 2020, we have distributed over 15,000 health and hygiene kits to people severely impacted by the economic shutdown or were in quarantine with C19. This would not be possible without the community support we received. Thank you!

Turning Point Pregnancy Resource Center

All of our services are free and confidential, and offered in English and Spanish. In 2021, 182 Clients received pregnancy testing, ultrasounds, pregnancy options and classes. 63 ultrasounds were performed by our Registered Nurse. 36 clients received material items from our baby boutique. 408 individual classes were taken by clients. The #1 video was "Labor & Delivery: Getting Ready" - viewed 184 times. 95 referrals were made to other community resource services.

Voices Jackson Hole

Due to the support of Old Bill's, Voices JH was able to compensate our immigrant mobilizer team to do their outreach work to 300 families from 17 different countries. This ensured that an estimated 1,000 immigrant and limited-English speaking individuals were aware of and had access to important local services, community resources and cultural events taking place in Teton County each week.

Watershed Jackson

With the funding from last year's grant we were able to take the Concussion Research project to the next level. We were able to sponsor summer and winter mountain athlete data collection sessions, equipment for each athlete, pay the fees and dues for to apply for an official medical study and pay a research intern.

Wyoming K-9 Search & Rescue, Inc.

Covid put another damper on training events in 2021, so we do have unspent funds (see above). In a normal year, this money would be used on more training and testing. We should use up much of these costs in



2022. Old Bill's money has been crucial in providing insurance for our animals, equipment, and testing, in order to keep our teams in top mission ready form.

Young Life Jackson Hole

In 2022, Young Life Jackson Hole started a new initiative of giving out goodie bags (ziploc bag with snacks and drink) to high school and middle school sports teams and clubs. Each bag had an inspirational quote and text number to anonymous teen hotline as a resource! Intended to be a pick-me-up during COVID and for teens to know they are not forgotten and there are people who care about them. We have passed out over 2500 bags so far!

Sports/Recreation

Advocates For Multi-Use of Public Lands

In the last year, AMPL worked with the Forest Service to ensure equal access to our public lands for our diverse, local recreation community. In partnership with Teton County Search & Rescue, we purchased ten trailhead beacon check devices and plan to install them at local trailheads before next winter. During warmer months, we worked with local non-profits to perform trail work on our National Forests, as well as initiate campaigns promoting safe, responsible recreation.

Axis Booster Club

Old Bills is the main fundraising mechanism for the Axis Booster Club. This past year the funds had direct impact on the competitive athletes as well as the community. We offered a free clinic with a visiting Ninja Warrior and sponsored the Halloween Maze, serving over 100 kids. We continue to allocate funds to offset travel expenses for regional and national qualifying athletes, Last May, we had the first Wyoming gymnast to ever qualify for national competition.

Carving The Future

In 2020, Wyoming had the highest suicide rate in the nation. We exist to promote physical, mental, and social confidence for each child as we help alleviate the mental health crisis. We believe access to outdoor activities skateboarding and snowboarding is critical to the wellbeing of our youth. The funds from old bills help us to easily provide access and resources for kids whose families cannot afford it in our expensive community. The number of children impacted by our nonprofit has increased 644.8% from the 18/19 to 20/21 season and into 2022. This year we provide full passes/lessons to 30 kids at snow king and were able to provide paid employment to a member of our team in the community. This is all thanks to the kind donors within Old Bills.

Chris Hodges Memorial Fund

We were able to grant 3 scholarships to Teton County graduating seniors, help out a family with medical needs and give to the local American Legion Baseball Program, Jackson Giants, for travel purposes

Coombs Outdoors

In 2021, Coombs Outdoors was able to support over 300 participants in ski programs, 151 participants in summer camps, and 35 students in after school programs. We launched new summer camp activities, partnerships, as well as a high school internship program.

Cycling Without Age Jackson Hole

Again, Covid-19 prevented CWA-JH from building on our successes from 2020 for the first half of our 2021 season, limiting our ability to serve the broader community with public rides. However, we were able to work with Legacy Lodge and St John's Living Center to train staff and family members as volunteer "pilots" who offered



rides to residential clients. We also partnered with Community Entry Services, and the Senior Center of JH in order to offer rides to entry service's clients, Pioneer Homestead residents, and community members who have few opportunities to enjoy the outdoors and our community.

Friends of Pathways

1 million trips recorded on pathways in 2021. 1.2 miles of buffered bike lanes established on Willow Street (Safe Routes to School Initiative). iWalk, iBike, iBus to school days at all the Elementary Schools: 1,000+ kids participated. How We Roll in Jackson Hole pathway etiquette campaign reached thousands of pathway users through video, social media postings and ad campaigns. Teton Trails project received 400 comments/input from community members was incorporated into Trails Master Plan. 700,000 annual user visits to the 130 miles of front country trails. 2.7 miles of new beginner trails constructed. Average Trips a day on most popular summer trails: 540 Josie's Ridge, 390 Snow King Summit Trail, 200 Ski Lake Trail. Average Trips a day on most popular winter trails: 500 Teton Pass, 450 Emily's Pond, 320 Cache Creek. 784 paid Youth Trail Crew hours. 204 trees cleared from trails. 72 volunteers donated 639 trail hours.

Gateway Church

Last year's grant allowed us to offset construction cost and material to fill in a small unused pond on our property which is now being used by the community as a free space to hold events open to the community this summer.

Giants Post 43 Baseball

Old Bill's is uniquely vital to a nonprofit organization like ours where we can continue to enhance the lives of young athletes to pursue higher level achievement in athletics and academics. Old Bill's over the years has provided the opportunity for our youth to play baseball but also be part of a national organization in the American Legion. This has been able to instill values in our players that has taught them to respect our veterans and what it is to sacrifice for the greater good.

Grand Teton Climber's Ranch

The Grand Teton Climbers' Ranch provides dormitory-style lodging at modest rates centrally located inside of Grand Teton National Park. Over the past six years, the GTCR provided an average of 4,426 bunk nights to guests. In 2021, the Ranch resumed operations following a historic closure in 2020 due to Covid-19. CFJH funding was, and continues to be, critical in the Ranch's ability to maintain and preserve its historical structures, which date back to 1924. Since 1970, the GTCR has acted as an authorized concession to the NPS, serving climbers and outdoor enthusiasts visiting Grand Teton National Park from around the globe. We provide community programming to guests, such as our Speaker Series and free bicycles to reduce traffic inside the park. Under the guidance of the NPS, the GTCR is working hard to implement an accessibility plan that ensures the Ranch can be enjoyed by all park visitors.

Jackson Bronc Backers

Thanks to the generous support of the Old Bill's Fun Run, Jackson Bronc Backers was able to provided funding for 16 Jackson Hole Highschool Teams, as well as, the Robotics Team, JHHS Speech and Debate Team and JHMS activities. The general fund allows JBB to fund additional projects, for example, hiring trained individuals to coordinate routines, bussing several groups to summer camps and trainings, paying for additional coaching staff, and providing hotel stays for students travel while representing Jackson throughout various groups. The money raised through Old Bill's Fun Run positively impacts the approximately 1500 students at JHHS & JHMS



Jackson Elite Volleyball Club

Last year's Old Bill's Fun Run grant had an incredibly positive impact on over 45 middle and high school girls who participated in Jackson Elite Volleyball's 2022 season. By covering a significant amount of the club's coaching fees, grant funds allowed us to maintain participant fees at historic levels and to offer scholarships to over a dozen girls, ensuring our program was accessible across the community. We are so grateful for the support through Old Bill's, it makes a truly meaningful difference for our small club!

Jackson Hole Babe Force

Funds raised through Old Bill's Fun Run directly supported programming for women in our community, including avalanche education, swiftwater safety education, a Rad Moms program for women, a backpacking clinic, and a joint Backcountry Zero program with Teton County Search and Rescue.

Jackson Hole FC

The detrimental effect of the Covid-19 Pandemic and subsequent 'spikes' on all aspects of Club operation lingers and has either reduced participation or cancelled events entirely. Our Club continues to adapt to current situations and continues to find opportunity for adult competitive soccer for the Teton County community. The Club is most proud of the local-oriented Adult Coed 7v7 Tournament from which all proceeds benefit the Jackson Hole High School Soccer Teams Booster Club.

Jackson Hole Juggernauts Roller Derby

With the impact from COVID and not being able to play for the last two years, the players, refs and spectators have really lost out. Now we are able to play again, giving everyone the chance to be an active participant in the roller derby community. We can't wait to bring back the athleticism and community service we have given over the past 10 years we've been a team.

Jackson Hole Kayak Club

There is no quantifying just how impactful Old Bill's grants are. It is humbling, every year, to see our community support the programs, opportunities and organizations that help make our community so unique and tight knit. This year, Old Bill's grants have created over ten new scholarship opportunities for area youth to enjoy our area's watershed, and allowed our experienced staff to continue their careers and pursue more certifications pertinent to outdoor recreation. To create a safe environment for a diverse range of students ushers in a new age of environmental stewards and adventurers who will advocate for not only our wild and special spaces, but those all over the world.

Jackson Hole Ski & Snowboard Club

Funds from 2022 Old Bill's Fun Run helped JHSC successfully deliver winter sports programs and character development to nearly 500 local youth. This funding helped us pursue our strategic goals of doubling our need-based scholarship funding to over \$100,000, making the Club more inclusive, and continue to expand partnerships with Coombs Outdoors. We continue to meet a higher standard in program delivery, sustainability and staffing as a Silver Certified Club designated by US Ski & Snowboard. This funding allowed us to expand initiatives that better serve the community and our athletes like more inclusive programming, expanded backcountry and avalanche awareness programming, enhanced student-athlete support and expanded year-round programming. From an athletic performance view, our programs are designed to support our student-athletes reach high levels of the sports and we continue to see these results in all programs.

Jackson Hole Stingrays



The funds from last years' Fun Run allowed JH Stingrays to provide a space and coaching for swimmers in Teton County to grow as athletes and team members, as well as travel to competitive events around the region. With COVID, we were able to accommodate fewer swimmers, but had to maintain our coaching staff, which increased the cost of our operations. We anticipate increased lane fees in the coming year as the Teton County Parks and Recreation Department adjusts its fee schedule and Old Bill's funds are critical to ensuring the team remains financially sound to carry out its mission.

Jackson Hole Youth Baseball - Cal Ripken Division

An affordable recreational activity for over 245 children in our community which teaches an active, healthy lifestyle, and lifelong skills of sportsmanship and teamwork. Thanks to Old Bill's we are able to keep our costs down and offer scholarships to kids that want to play the game. Last year we were able to add one more travel team to our club because the numbers were so high in participation. Continuing this same activity in the community makes us all unite and become stronger in our relationships of team building and community building.

Jackson Hole Youth Basketball

Thanks to the support of Old Bill's we were able to continue growing our programs to include over 275 local youth. The organization continues to grow with the help of dedicated families, board members, and staff. Jackson Hole Youth Basketball is pleased to partner with Teton County Parks and Recreation and the Jackson Hole High School basketball programs to offer leagues, camps, clinics and tournaments throughout the year to boys and girls grades 1 through 12. Our girls travel program doubled in size from 2020-2021. We are thrilled to have more girls playing basketball. We hope to continue our programs by expanding and improving on our coaching and helping to instill the core values of JHYB which are: growth mindset, effort, learning, freedom to make mistakes, and respect for the game.

Jackson Hole Youth Mountain Biking

Old Bill's funds helped JHYMB continue to operate during our 2021 season, registering 90 middle and high school student athletes. These riders were led by 35 licensed volunteer coaches in more than 50 weekly mountain bike practices in the Idaho League of the National Interscholastic Cycling Association. The team also participated in local trail cleanup maintenance efforts and volunteer days. We continue to provide quality mountain bike programming to young athletes and to grow lifelong mountain bikers and cyclists.

Jackson Hole Youth Soccer

Jackson Hole Youth Soccer (JHYS) impacts a large segment of our local community. We operate soccer programs in the spring, fall, as well indoor training in the winter and camps during the summer. Last year JHYS had approximately 675 players with 1,060 total registrations for our programs. Players represent a wide spectrum (3U to 19U). In total, JHYS provides healthy after school options for roughly 30% of all kids in local schools. Our programs provide a positive impact on the education and development of children in the Jackson Hole community. We teach the ethics of hard work, the benefits of teamwork, self and team discipline along with the satisfaction of putting in the effort to achieve goals. Donations from Old Bill's is critical to our success as it allows JHYS to keep registration fees as low as possible. We remain grateful for the support we receive from the community.

Jackson Youth Hockey

Jackson Youth Hockey served 286 youth skaters during the 2021-22 season. Our program remains the largest youth program in Wyoming. This is directly related to providing outstanding programming, increased opportunity across all age levels, and financial assistance to those families in need. Every scholarship application that was received in the 2021-2022 season was once again funded. Our program has been able to provide more



practice and game opportunities, more experienced and certified coaching, and new equipment for our young athletes thanks to the gracious efforts of Old Bill and our amazing community. Our accolades have amassed 12 State Championships in the past three years and over 70 girls playing hockey in Jackson which is also the largest Girls hockey program in the State of Wyoming.

JH Pony Club

Jackson Hole Pony Club has been a fixture in Jackson for many years but finding opportunities for riding instruction here is increasingly difficult. Old Bill's funding helps us bring in quality instructors to educate kids in safe horsemanship.

JH Winter Wonderland Ice rink on the square

The development of JHWW has become multi-faceted in its ability to meet needs within the community and add to the tourist experience of Jackson Hole. Through Old Bill's Fun Run, we provided public skating opportunities during after school hours and weekends, an affordable family activity for the community and tourists alike, and we provide a distinctive character to the square and the Teton Village commons, bringing vitality to the valley during the winter. This year we serviced over 5,100 participants, including multiple repeat families and youth, locals, and tourists. These numbers only reflect rental users as those with their own skates so do free at any time. We estimate over 5,600 users this for the 2020/2021 season. How many people come to skate mainly depends on when we open it all depends on snow and weather. For example this year the ice rink in the Town square we started on January 4th which is very late.

Skating Club of Jackson Hole

Supported continued growth of Teton adaptive sports Sled Hockey program, supported general operations, continued to provide hourly ice rates for youth hockey programs.

Teton Adaptive Sports

Funds received through Old Bill's Fun Run assist in providing quality coaching, expertise, and equipment usage, while keeping the price affordable to all. Our programs fill a much-needed role for healthy activity during the critical after-school hours by providing a safe, structured environment for the children of working parents. Our goal is to provide after-school extracurricular activities that help build confidence and self-esteem which can boost academic performance, reduce risky behaviors, and promote physical and mental health. Funds from Old Bill's Fun Run also assisted in producing the annual Holiday on Ice performance. This holiday production is one of the most widely attended performances in Teton County, providing an opportunity for friends, family, and community members to witness the culmination of all the hard work and dedication from the skaters in our program. Skaters who participated in the Holiday on Ice ranged in age from 3 years old through adult.

Teton Back Country Horsemen

TBCH installed tie-up areas at a trail head in Turpin Meadows where many horsemen begin or end their journeys into the back country. By creating specific areas for horses to be tied, this will eliminate the overuse of other areas which allows for noxious weeds to develop. TBCH installed a hitching rail at Dornan's restaurant in Moose. We replaced a hitching rail that was already there that had become unsafe. Tourists absolutely love seeing horses tied up at the rail!!

Teton Backcountry Alliance



Funds from Old Bills was the primary source of income for TBCA. These funds made it possible for TBCA to do ALL its activities, including participating in Teton Pass planning, address issues related to recreation during Covid, raising public awareness on issues related to Targhee expansion, and more. Without Old Bills NONE of this would have been possible.

Teton County/Jackson Parks and Recreation Department

The funds that are used raised from Old Bill's Fun Run for Parks and Recreation goes towards our scholarship program. This has helped 25 families to date be able to attend our summer camp program. More than ever families are going to need this assistance to be able to provide their child an experience that will have a meaningful impact.

Teton Freeriders, Inc.

The funds from Old Bill's Fun Run last year were used for trail maintenance, repair, and administrative expenses. The trail system in Teton County continues to see an exponential increase in users. With these funds, we were able to put 1,574 hours of paid labor hours and 1,620 volunteer labor hours back into the community trail system. We greatly appreciate the support of Old Bill's Fun Run.

Funds are used to cover TTR's insurance, marketing and annual club expenditures to promote our Mission Statement

Teton Valley Ranch Camp Education Foundation

Old Bill's funding helps TVRC to partner with local businesses, support scholarships for local kids, and work with local organizations to expand access to the outdoors. The funds raised in last year's Old Bill's Fun Run supported TVRC's continued work in Teton County by funding key parts of our backcountry programming and other necessary services provided by community businesses and further enabling us to support scholarships for Teton County kids. This year to date we've extended \$5,200 in scholarships to Teton County campers. Additionally, we are continuing to grow our partnership with GAP, and this funding helped us to make that work a reality. This year we are also working with Coombs Outdoors through funding provided by the Community Foundation of Jackson Hole.

The Teton Climbers' Coalition

While the inability to meet in person proved challenging, the TCC nonetheless achieved a number of important accomplishments in our focal areas over the past year. Advocacy: Helped secure final approval for full scope of Rec Center climbing gym; collaborated on coordinated approach to management of Teton bighorn sheep and winter recreation. Stewardship: Led Rodeo Wall Adopt-A-Crag Stewardship Project; restored the Teton Boulder Park to its full potential. Engagement: Partnered with Parks & Rec to save Town Pump bouldering series; began monthly happy hours to engage the community. In 2022, we received our 501c3 nonprofit status, which allows us to continue to work on behalf of our community.
